## TAXES ON McCLARY COMPANY

Amount Must Be Considered by the Aldermen.

The Firm Asks for Fixed Assessment of \$150,000

And Presents Proposition to the Council-Monday Will Be Proclaimed a Holiday.

A very important letter frem the McClary Manufacturing Company, which was read before the city council last night, produced something of a mild sensation, because, though some would be read, it was apparent that to and most of them it was entirely new and unexpected. In it Mr. McClary asked in brief that the assessment of his company be placed at \$150,000 for all purpoes for a term of not less than ten years after the present limitation expires, and that in case of amended legislation the company be protected from increased taxation. His letter was

"Our limitation of assessment expires early in 1902, and in view of the assessment act of this province on personal property, as applied to an in-corporated manufacturing company of a large capital being beyond all reasonable legitimate limits, we ask you to procure at the next session of the Ontario Government legislation limiting our assessment to \$150,000 per year for all purposes for the term of not ss than ten years after the expiration of the present limitation, and should we have amended legislation our assessment not to exceed what it would be under amended legislation, as in this case we might be compelled to pay a tax to the government the same or similar to the tax imposed in the

Province of Quebec. At the beginning, he stated that this was the third time that he had appeared before the city council of London for a similar purpose, and on the two preceding occasions the aldermen, believing his proposition to be advantageous to the city, had entertained it without dissent. His proposition this time was no mean one.
