A New Departure.

The Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railway has recently put in service on its Pioneer Limited train the largest and handsomest dining car ever built. It is 32 feet in length from tip to tip, and its body is 6 inches wider and higher than the usual dining car. It seats 36 people comfortably in movable chairs and has a kitchen large enough to permit the working of six cooks, which, with six waiters and a conductor, make up the crew. The dining-car heretofore in service did not provide sufficient space to properly care for the large number of patrons of the Pioneer, so that it became necessary to have a larger car.

WARM WEATHER HELPS BUSINESS

Large Falling Off in Canadian Failures Last Week.

THE RETAILERS MORE CHEERFUL

Summer Stocks Being Well Worked Off—Collections Fair—Good Outlook for Fall Trade.

Toronto, July 19.—Bradstreet's trade review, weekly summary:

Warm, weather helps Canadian trade. Canadian clearing aggregate \$43,885,244—a decrease of 12 per cent. last week, but a gain of 7.3 per cent. on last year. Failures number 17, against 28 last week and in this week a year ago.

In London there has been a fair inquiry for summer goods to sort stocks, and with a continuance of the present hot weather it is expected that the sorting demand may yet improve before the close of the season. Crop prospects are very encouraging and are stimulating the purchases of fall goods the prices of which continue firm.

In Hamilton there has been a very fair movement in wholesale trade circles this week. Orders for current requirements of trade are fair, and things considered. Fall orders are numerous and well distributed. Country remittances are fair for this season.

Business at Quebec has been favorably affected by the warm weather. Retailers are in a more cheerful mood, and they are placing some very liberal orders for the fall. The encouraging reports of the crops are helping business in many lines. The demand from the Northwest is good in many departments of wholesale trade, and it promises to increase when crop prospects become more certain. Country remittances are fair for this season, and no failures of any account are reported.

At Ottawa there has been fair movement in wholesale trade circles this week. The generally hopeful outlook for the crops throughout the country is stimulating the purchase of fall and winter goods.

Trade at Montreal the past week has been fairly good, and there is a more confident feeling in business circles as a result of the hot weather, which is helping the retailers to dispose of their summer stocks. Travelers are sending in good orders for the fall trade, and generally the volume of business done so far seems to exceed that for last year at this date. Values of staple goods continue very firm.

Business at Quebec has been fairly active, both in wholesale and retail circles. Collections, as a rule, are reported fair. Crop prospects, although not so favorable as past seasons, are encouraging, and an average yield is general.

At Pacific coast points there is a little more confidence in the wholesale trade. The business with the Yukon the past ten days has been much larger, and the prospects for that district are very bright.

There is pronounced activity in the lumber, coal mining and fishery industries, and a little more activity in gold mining. Payments are fairly fair. In Winnipeg there has been continued activity in wholesale trade circles. Labor is not very plentiful, and it is feared that there will be a scarcity of hands to take off the crops next month. With a continuance of fine growing weather, it is expected grain raising will be a very early next month. Payments are fair for this season.

OVER THE BORDER.

New York, July 19.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s review: Settlement of numerous labor contracts and of respect of early agreements to other struggles have greatly improved the industrial outlook, while agricultural conditions steadily improve. Preparations for unusually heavy harvest are being made and confidence grows stronger. Financial conditions are sound, the mid-year dividend distributions producing no stringency, and speculation has been heavy this season, both in securities and staples.

Rye stocks established a new high record, while the corn manipulation has a settlement without causing any failures. Pig iron continues to command full prices. New orders are reported for distant delivery running about a year ahead. Structural material is still in demand. Agricultural implement makers are fully employed. A general advance in prices of machine tools has occurred, averaging nearly 10 per cent. Agricultural manufacturers of cotton goods hold prices steady, and there has been a distinct increase in demand during the past week. New lines of light weight woollens and worsteds have opened up unchanged prices, and the increased activity of mills has aroused more interest in the raw material, which tends to advance.

Eastern shoe shops receive more orders, some of the larger producers refusing contracts calling for delivery before October. Prices are firmly held. Liabilities of companies are \$2,878,519 last week. Failures this week in the United States are 213, against 193 last week, 155 the preceding week and 193 the corresponding week last year, and in Canada 29, against 19 last week, 8 the preceding week, and 22 last year. Of failures this week in the United States, 85 were in the east, 50 south, 64 west, and 14 in the Pacific States, and 64 report liabilities of \$5,000 or more.

CHANGES IN THE CABINET

George Wyndham Remains Chief Secretary for Ireland.

A Number of Ministers May Exchange Portfolios.

London, July 19.—The Duke of Devonshire, president of the council; the Marquis of Lansdowne, secretary of state for foreign affairs; Joseph Chamberlain, the colonial secretary; the Earl of Selborne, first lord of the admiralty, and the Marquis of Londonderry, postmaster-general, it is understood, have consented to retain their present portfolios in the new cabinet. Lord George Hamilton, secretary of state for India, C. T. Ritchie, the home secretary; R. V. Hanbury, president of the board of agriculture; W. St. John Brodriock, secretary of state for war; Akenside Douglas, first commissioner of works, and Walter Long, president of the local government board, will remain in the cabinet, but their portfolios may be changed. George Wyndham will remain Chief Secretary for Ireland, but with a seat in the cabinet, the new lord lieutenant having no seat in the cabinet and being rather a social representative of the sovereign than a political representative of the Government.

SAVED GROVER CLEVELAND

From the Clutches of a Game Warden—Now the Two Go Fishing.

Winsted, Conn., July 18.—Cassius Scranton, of Winsted, a well-known millwright, has received a letter from Grover Cleveland inviting him to go on a fishing trip. Mrs. Scranton said today:

"Last year when the game wardens pounced down on Mr. Cleveland and Bryant and my husband and I, we were in their possession a bass two inches shorter than is lawful to take from the waters of Massachusetts. My husband, who had the blame, was subsequently arrested and haled to court and fined \$2, but he never caught that fish."

"Did Mr. Cleveland?"
"I can't say," Mrs. Scranton replied, hesitatingly. Then she added with a smile, "He wouldn't do to tell."

BRAVE BOY DYING

Worked Too Hard and Starved Himself to Support the Family.

New York, July 18.—"Jimmy" McCabe, 8 years old, was taken last night from his home in Far Rockaway, L. I., so weak that it was feared he would not live until morning. The little fellow provided a living for his mother and two tiny sisters he worked too much and ate too little.

His father, Dr. McCabe, formerly owned three saloons at Rockaway Beach and was considered rich. He lost his money and then disappeared. Mrs. McCabe worked to support her three children until she lost her health, and then "Jimmy" took up the burden.

"Don't you care, mother?" he said, and little Annie and the baby won't want for anything. I'm going to take care of you all. I'm going to start selling newspapers in the morning. Phil Cronin is going to set me up in business."

"Jimmy's" financial backer was Philip T. Cronin, superintendent of buildings, lighting and supplies of the Borough of Queens, and Democratic supply of papers for the borough and asked friends to contribute to the fund. For eight months to youngster maintained the battle with the world, but at last he fell unconscious in the street. Dr. Cronin, who was summoned, shook his head and said: "Poor little chap, I'm afraid he can't last long. Dying from want and work at his age."

HURT BY A RUNAWAY AUTO

Five Children Got in the Track of the Machine.

Somebody Touched the Lever When Chauffeur Wasn't Looking.

New York, July 18.—A big gasoline automobile, unattended and uncontrolled, ran off the top of the Rockaway street Thursday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock. It knocked over passing children and peddlers' carts and ran down five children, injuring every one. Dr. Bernard Frankel, of No. 74 Livingston street, was making calls in the machine when it was out of control. When the physician went inside the house, the automobile took to the streets. Somebody passing by—who, the police could not find out, saw the apparently deserted automobile and gave the power lever a shove up to the limit. With a whizz and a puff the big thing started off. The street was crowded with throngs hurrying home from work, children playing on the pavements, passing vehicles and push carts.

It plowed through them all. Grown folks jumped to right and left, but the children were not so fortunate. Peddlers who couldn't wheel out of its erratic course in time had their carts tipped over. Two wagons were overturned.

Waterbury was on his feet in a jiffy, making for the machine as it cut spirals down the street. Policeman Timbercamp, of the Eldridge street station, was a close second. For two blocks it rushed along in strange and unexpected curves, leaving a trail of bruised children behind it.

Finally the unwieldy thing got going in a circle, and Waterbury, making a plucky flying leap, landed in the seat. He shut off the power before more damage was done. There was a hurry call for doctors when the crowd saw the injured children lying on the pavement.

All five had bruises and scalp wounds. They were Abraham Knecht, 10, scalp wound and punctured eyeball; Isidor Reich, 11, and Morris Reich, 6, brothers, severe scalp wounds; Benjamin Schwartz, 8, scalp wound and bad bruises; Nathan Mandel, 7, leg lacerated and scalp wound. Dr. Frankel gave chase after his machine, too, and when he saw the damage he called Dr. Eisenberg and Dr. Bunkel, who attended the little sufferers and sent them home.
