ANCIENT CUSTOMS. The customs of Hallowe'en, sometimes called All Hallow's Eve, or Nut-crack and Snapapple Night, are plainly relics of pagan times. A feast to Pomona, goddess of fruits and seeds, was always held by the Romans on Nov. 1, and the stores gathered during the summer were then opened for winter's use. At this same time the Druids held a festival of thanksgiving to the sun for their harvest. The Druids also believed in the transmission of souls, and thought that on this night the Lord of Death summoned the spirits which had been condemned within the previous year to possess the bodies of November was one of the periods when bonfires were lighted in honor of Baal. This lighting of fires continued in Great Britain until a comparatively recent time. In Wales especially was the custom long ad-Every family made its own fire, and when it burned low each one threw in among the embers a smooth white stone, marked for future recog-Woe to any whose stone was missing in the morning, for it betokened certain death to that one within a year. The firetending was usually accompanied by the eating of nuts, apples and parsnips and by various games. Many of these customs and games have come down to us, and with various changes and additions are played today with as much ardor as they were of old; the chief difference being that whereas in early times they were ceremonies of belief, they are new occasions of sport, pastimes for fun and jest-loving people. ROASTING NUTS.

It may be added, however, that there is doubtless many a merrymaker who wishes that some of the prophecies concerning Hallowe'en customs might really prove true. One of the most common practices of all is the roasting of nuts. Three nuts are placed on the grate before the fire and named by the person testing fate and fortune. If the nut jumps off, that lover is unfaithful; if the nut blazes or burns, so does his love; if the nut named after the girl and her lover burns until consumed, the wedding gown may as well be ordered at once. The nut-shells are sometimes burned and from their ashes many strange things may be

BOBBING FOR APPLES. Then there are apples-subjects for much merry sport and matrimonial divination. In a basin or tub of water a number of rosy-cheeked apples are placed, some having the stems left on, to assist in their capture. It may seem easy enough to secure a prize, but it is really a rather difficult matter to catch a round slippery apple with the teeth. The surest way, it is said, is to force it to the bottom of the tub where it may be held until caught firmly. If one does not succeed after three tempts, spinisterhood or bachelorhood is assured without a shadow of doubt. game, known as bobbing for apples, creates all manner of fun and laughter, as one after the other of the party emerges, dripping, if not triumphant, from the contest.

APPLE AND CANDLE GAME. The apple and candle game is an other favorite. From the ceiling a strong cord is suspended, and it is tied to the center of a stick about two feet ong. To one end of this stick an apple is fastened; to the other end a lighted candle. The string is set in motion and contestants try to catch the apple with their teeth; to catch the lighted candle instead isn't as funny as it might be; indeed, as it is not altogether pleasant or even safe to play their right, unless the left is injured.

Ghosts, Goblins, Witches and with fire, instead of the candle a bag of some thin material filled with flour may be substituted. When the person trying to snatch the fruit is struck in the face with the bag, and covered with flour instead of glory, it only adds to the fun, which grows fast and furious. Here, too, three attempts to catch the fruit with failure each time,

is a fatal blow to all hopes of a speedy marriage.

PARING THE PIPPIN. If a maiden wishes to discover the initials of her future husband's name, all she need do is to peel a nice large pippin, and taking one end of the paring in her fingers, she must swing it twice around her head and then let it drop. At least the first initial may be traced in the shape the paring will take. The Irish lass, and any who wish to follow her example, may see the likeness of her future husband in this wise. She has always been interested in mission work, and when the call came for workers in the field she offered herself, and was accepted. The large gathering showed the esteem in which she is held in this community. She left today for Toronto, and sails from New York on Saturday. Miss Pratt is a daughter of Mr. William Pratt, alderman, and late secretary of the Imperial Oil Company here.

AMONG THE INDIANS. Toronto, Oct. 29. - Regarding the statements of Archbishop Langevin on Sunday in Montreal that the Presbyterian missionaries among the Indians in the Northwest were interfering seriously with their work and perverting their converts, the Rev. R. P. MacKay, one of the missionary officials of the Presbyterian Church, today made the following statement: "I am afraid the good archbishop is not prepared to state all the facts. One of the chief difficulties Protestant missionaries have to contend with in the Northwest or British Columbia is the persistent efforts of the Roman Catholic priests to defeat their work. In British Columbia the priest visited all the bands on the west coast in one month, baptized hundreds of children, then called them Catholics. No more was done for them. To the eye of the archbishop they were converted, but to our eyes they are as pagan as ever. We send misisonaries to them, open schools and establish permanent Christian work, under many protests, it is true, but what else could be done? If the Roman Catholic Church really did the work we would be delighted. The Indian brings no ecclestastical advantage to the Presbyterian Church. He will never be a strong factor in church work. It is purely a benevolent en-terprise on our part. We cannot see them wasting away totally neglected. I do not wish to be understood as saying that the Roman Catholic Church is doing no work in other quarters. They have many schools even on the west coast of British Columbia; they started a school in our immediate neighborhood after we went into that region. We have thus provoked them to good works."

INTERESTING ANNIVERSARY. Ottawa, Oct. 28. — His Grace Archbishop Duhamel, of the Diocese of Ottawa, celebrated today the 28th anniversary of his elevation to the bishopric. Another Presbyterian Minister Replies | Chandler-Dunbar Company's Power To Be Utilized.

> Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Oct. 29. — William Chandler, of the Chandler-Dunbar Water Power Company, which controls the rights on St. Mary's Falls north of the ship canal, and has power developed, states that plans have been perfected for the development of power there to the largest extent, and for the establishment of a paper mill. The American Soo Paper Company has been capitalized at \$4,000,000, and the money proposed for its investments at the Soo has all been provided for.
>
> The general plans for the plant have been prepared and only a few minor details are left to be worked out. The plans contemplate the put-ting in of a pulp grinding plant of a daily capacity of 125 tons, a sulphite mill of 35 tons and paper mills capable

of turning out 150 tons of paper a Sulphite and paper mills will be erected about 600 feet directly west of the present power house, the whole plant being so located as as not to interfere with the widening of the ship canal or building of a third lock if the Government decides to make these improvements.

The company leases its power from the Chandler-Dunbar Water Power Company, and has contracted for 10,000 horse-power, with an option on 5,000 horse-power additional. The plans of the power house are so drawn as to admit of adding thereto and taking in the full power controlled by the company, estimated at between 60,000 and 70,000 horse-power.

The entire works contemplated at the canal will involve the expenditure next year of \$2,000,000, of which the Soo will receive the direct benefit of every cent. The construction of the power house, mills, etc., will be of concrete, stone and steel, while the machinery will be the latest and most approved pattern, the whole plant constituting one of the most complete and up-to-date concerns of the kind in the world.

### BOERS IN CANADA

The Delegates Visit Niagara Falls-Want Canadian Harrows.

Hamilton, Oct. 29.—The Boer delegates, five in number, sent from South Africa to study the conditions in this Africa to study the conditions in this country, arrived in Hamilton yesterday, and spent the afternoon in the Grimsby fruit district, visiting several of the leading fruit farms. The Boer party consists of W. L. and Mrs. Jooste, of Klerksdorp, Transvaal; S. J. M. and Mrs. Lane, of Klerksdorp, and H. T. Rood, of Ermelo. They are in charge of Capt. Kirkpatrick, D. S. O., of the imperial army, and Mrs. Kirkpatrick. The later is a Boer lady, and was married to Capt. Kirkpatrick just prior to their departure from Preprior to their departure from Pretoria for this country. Delegates Jooste and Lane wee members of Cronje's army that surrendered et Paardeberg. The party went to the falls in the evening.
