Buried Four Hours Under Wheat

Montreal, June 24.—Sixteen coal trimmers were buried for four hours under 30,000 bushels of wheat in the hold of the Lake Manitoba last night and barely escaped with their lives. They were only saved by the anxiety of a boarding-house keeper, who sent to the ship to ask when his gang was

going to eat. Steam shovels were put to work. Two men with wet sponges over their mouths, to keep out dust, went into the hold. They found that the sixteen men had crowded together below, a pipe leading to the outer air. They were all safe, but weak from the terrible heat and the expectation of dying where they lay.

Senator Scott Knighted By King

London, June 24.—Senator Hon. R. W. Scott, former Dominion secretary of state, is made a knight bachelor. Other recipients of King's birthday honors are as follows:

The order of C. M. G. is conferred on Harold Newcombe, Canadian deputy minister of justice; on Matthew J. Butler, Canadian deputy minister of railways and canals.

George Ross, Dominion superintendent of postoffices, is made a member of

the Imperial Service Order, as is W. J. Gerald, Canadian deputy minister of inland revenue.

Among the other honors conferred is that of knighthood on Arthur Wing Pinero, the dramatist; Herbert Beer-bohm Tree, the actor; Henry W. Lucy (Toby), M. P. of Funch, and F. J. Campbell, principal of the Royal Normal College and Academy of Music for the Blind. Mr. Campbell is an American by birth, having been born near Winchester, Tenn., in 1832.

A Mob Lynches a Negro Preacher

Talbotton, Ga., June 24.—Rev. Joe Hardy, a colored preacher, was lynched some time last night because he was stirring up strife between the races.

The lynching of the preacher is closely connected with the killing of the negro, Will Caneker, by a mob on Wednesday morning. Caneker was lynched for killing William Leonard, a prominent planter, and it is alleged, Hardy instigated him.

He came here from Atlanta, and in his sermons told the negroes not to

work for white folks at all. It was with great difficulty that farmers in that section could keep their hands at work when this preacher was around. A number of white men went to whip him and drive him off. He was at Caneker's house. Leonard remained to keep back the negroes, while the other men drove off the preacher. Caneker saw Leonard and shot him dead. For this he was lynched.

The preacher, who was blind, managed to escape, but was captured some time last night and also was lynched.

WILL RAISE THE RATES

An Important Decision by the Sons of Scotland Society.

Toronto, June 24.—After a protracted discussion last night the grand camp of the Sons of Scotland Benevolent Society decided to revise their rates, and adopt the Hunter rate, the scale of rates authorized by the Dominion insurance act. The increase will apply to all classes of members, and will come into force on Sept. 1.

The debate, which lasted for several hours, was taken part in by many members, the principal speakers being Grand Chief Fraser, Rev. D. McCrae, Dr. Ferguson, Dr. Battle, of Ottawa; Mr. L. C. Barclay, of Whitby; Mr. J. E. Ferguson, of Montreal; Mr. Morgan, of Collingwood, and Mr. D. McNab, of Barrie.

Most of the discussion centred around the class A members, all of whom joined the society prior to 1885.

The feeling of the meeting at first was to make some special concessions in favor of this class, but towards the close this feeling changed, and the meeting finally decided upon treating all members alike. The new rates will be fixed according to the members' age at the dates they joined the society.

One of the results of the new rates will be to extend the society's field of operations, as it is an ideal one for those seeking either health or sport.

A FIERCE STORM BREAKS OVER CORINTH

Two Men Shocked by Lightning—One May Die—Their Horse Killed.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Tillsonburg, June 24.—A severe electric storm passed over this section about 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon doing considerable damage in and around the village of Corinth, about seven miles from here. Nelson Auger, a farmer living about a mile south of Corinth, was working in a field with a neighbor, D. Firby, when the storm broke, and the two men, taking the horse, fled to a tree for shelter. A bolt struck the horse, killing it instantly and severely injuring the men, burning Mr. Auger on the hand and arm and rendering him unconscious. Mr. Firby, although severely shocked, soon rallied and called the neighbors to Mr. Auger's assistance. Mr. Auger was taken to his house and medical assistance secured, but so far he had not yet regained consciousness, and only slight hopes are entertained for his recovery.

Mrs. Isaac Connoy, the section foreman at Corinth, was inside her house watching the storm, when one of the trees in front nearly was struck. The shock also affected Mrs. Connor, injuring her side and back, and rendering her unconscious for a time.

CITY AND TOWNSHIP ARE AT LOGGERHEADS

Over the Matter of Payment for Work Done on Scanlan Drain in East London.

There was a lively time at the meeting of the board of works last night as a result of Reeve Kimball stating that the city owes London Township \$1,400 for work done as long ago as 1903, and also that if the city want to sue the township for \$410 alleged to be due as their share of the work on the Scanlan drain in East London they can go ahead and try it, as the township will fight it to a finish.

Reeve Kimball asked how the city based their claims for the account. Engineer Graydon went over the details of an agreement that was reached some time ago. Unfortunately, there is no written agreement, and Reeve Kimball contended that what has been done so far in no way gives the township any value at all for the work on the drain. He said the county is spending \$2,600 in doing what should have been done, and if the city wants to collect the money they can go ahead. Had the township got what they expected, Reeve Kimball contended, it would never have been necessary to spend the \$2,600.

Is City in Arrears?

Reeve Kimball and Ald. Cooper got into an argument over the paying bills, and the former produced statements, showing that the city owes the county about \$1,489.

"I think it is time we had an audit of the accounts between the city and county," said Ald. Cooper.

"I can state to you gentlemen candidly," said Mr. Kimball, "that the county won't pay the Scanlan drain bill without a fight."

"I have looked into this matter very carefully," he continued. "Why, your own committee disagree as to what the arrangements were."

"We have done all we agreed to do," said Ald. Cooper.

Ald. Saunders moved that the matter be left in the hands of the city engineer to investigate and report on the next meeting on Thursday evening. Carried.

An Argument.

Ald. Cooper and the mayor had an argument over the delay in paying bills, and the former produced statements, showing that the city owes the county about \$1,489.

"That is all poppycock," said Ald. Cooper warmly. "Those men have settled the matter among themselves long ago and I want to know why the street is not being opened."

Nobody seconded Ald. Cooper's motion and the matter dropped.

Toronto, Ont., June 25.—Orders have been issued at Osgoode Hall dismissing all the federal election protests, with the exception of those against J. R. Stratton in West Peterboro, and Wm. Thoburn, in North Lanark. Those dropped include Norfolk, South Ontario, Centre York, Nipissing and Welland, and the petition against Sir Wilfrid Laurier in Ottawa.

The order for the dismissal of the Ottawa protest has been granted by Mr. Justice Tuckwell, and will be signed this afternoon. Only the Peterboro and North Lanark cases are set down for trial.

The regular meeting of the license commissioners will be held tomorrow evening. The application for the transfer of the Barrell House license from Mr. E. Barrell to Mr. J. Collins will be considered. It is understood that there will not be any objections to the transfer taking place.

Still in Bad Shape.

Dr. R. W. Shaw, who is attending William Carroll, the blind man who was so badly burned as a result of his celluloid coat catching fire from a match, states that Carroll is still in very bad shape, although some slight improvement is noticeable. The case is one of the worst that the hospital staff have ever had to deal with, as Carroll walked around for a long time before he made his way to the hospital, and the wounds became terribly irritated and poisoned from contact with his clothes. It is believed that he will recover.

A fine portrait of the late Robert Pritchard, mayor of the city in 1877, was presented to Mayor Stevely today by Mr. John Pritchard, his brother. It was painted by Mr. J. P. Hunt, the
