O. H. A. Will Not Tolerate Players Ready With the Battle Axe—More Register.

Toronto Globe: The O. H. A. suspension of rough players will not do anything in the mix-up line. Players that go to the fence too often will be suspended without further notice. The association demands clean hockey, and intends to have it at any cost. The reports of the referees will be closely watched, and players mentioned for rough work will be severely dealt with when it becomes evident that they are contracting a habit of rough work. The penalty will be severe—sufficient to stop this kind of thing—and it simply means that rough-housed players will be hauled out of the game.

Had he been able to catch the bases more closely he would have won many a game that was charged up to the defeat column later in the season. Krause is working hard to overcome his lone fault and will be a much-improved man when he does.

In Bailey St. Louis has a southpaw who promises much. Bailey has a world of speed and a good curve. His only weakness is the fact that he is a trifle frail. He has the nerve, however, that should overcome this one weakness. Graham, the other Brownie, has a lot of stuff, but he can't hold much from Jim McGuire's youngsters.

Boston has Karger, a former veteran of ability, and Walters, an uncertainty. Washington has "Dolly" Gray, who should be a good man for the Nationals this year, while New York hopes that Jim Vaughan will deliver, and St. Louis expects much from Jim McGuire's youngsters.

Passing Out.

If Killian's arm was as good as his nerve he could go on pitching forever, but his left wing is nearly gone. Jennings had hope for much from Speer, but the dapper little southpaw failed to do anything much all year.
