It Is Said There Will Be a Discount of 40 Per Cent.

The basic rates for Niagara power both for domestic and business lighting, and power purposes, have now been made public. heavy mass of steel count clush the man's body it was stopped by the heavy packed snow. He escaped with a broken hip and a few bruises.

The power rates, as phonsned yester-day, are from \$40 to \$50 per horse power, according to the amount used, minus the discount. The power rates, as published yester-

minus the discount.

The lighting rates are 10 cents per month per 100 square feet of floor space in the house, and 10 cents a kilowatt hour per month, minus the discount. The London Electric rate is 18 cents, with a per cent discount.
These latter figures contain very little information of the real cost of power, merely furnishing the maximum rate. The real rate will be determined by the discount, which must be settled by the information of commissioners. That will depend alto-gether on local conditions, and must be improved by the board. It is stated that the power rates will be given a discount of say 15 per cent, while the lighting rates may be reduced as much as 40 rates may be reduced as much as 40 per cent.

The statement is made at the city hall

that domestic lighting will be at least 40 per cent cheaper than under the present schedule.
