MUCH IMMORALITY FOUND IN LONDON

Miss Darch Rather Surprised Her Hearers at the W. C. T. U. Meeting.

The Woman's Christian Temperance Union met in the hall of the public library on Tuesday, with their president, Mrs. Ashburn, in the chair.

Minutes and treasurer's report were read, and sailors' and lumbermen's work reported on.

Miss Darch, deaconess of the First Methodist Church, spoke about her work among children. She had been working among the children of Toronto slums before coming to London, and she has learned that it is difficult to know just how to handle them so as to avoid doing them harm. In London also she finds this same trouble.

Sensational Statement.

One assertion she made startled her audience. It was that she had worked among the poor of Winnipeg, Port Arthur, Toronto, Hamilton and Montreal, and has found in London more immorality than in any of these cities. There may possibly be an error in this report as to the exact names of the cities, but the statement remains correct that she has found London, "Our City of Homes," our "City of No Slums," more steeped in immorality than a number of other of our Canadian cities. Wake up fellow-citizens! If she be not in error it is high time some remedy should be found. Discussion even will do no harm if it bring forth a moral improvement. London children are too fine material to be allowed to waste, if means can be found to save and rear them into the noble citizenship they are capable of making.

The next meeting, March 22, is superintendents' reports day, and it is most earnestly to be desired that all members will be present with full reports of the work of each of the departments. In case any are unavoidably absent, at least, they should send a full and explicit report of their success or failure along the line of endeavor for which they have undertaken to be responsible.

BUDGET REJECTION CAME VERY HIGH

London, March 8.—The rejection of the budget by the House of Lords in the preceding Parliament cost the country in loss of revenue \$142,500,000 in the current financial year, according to a statement made by David Lloyd George in the House of Commons today.

The chancellor of the exchequer added that it was impossible to say what proportion of this loss could be ultimately recovered.

The matter of inspecting underground bake shops was left over until the next meeting. It was pointed out that the Provincial Government had the question under advisement at the present time, and it was thought better to wait until it was seen what action was finally taken.
