PAPERS READ ON USES OF CEMENT

Large Audience Were Greatly Interested at the Convention in Princess Rink.

A WORD AS TO THE COST

Illustration Showing What Can Be Done—Attendance Was Large Afternoon and Evening.

At the cement convention yesterday a large crowd listened to many excellent papers prepared by experts on the uses of cement and concrete, while 1,500 people not so interested in the technical as the practical side visited the exhibition of cement machinery in the Princess Rink.

The exhibits at the latter place were not all in position until the evening session, but are now properly placed. Yesterday afternoon President Peter Gillespie, of Toronto, read his annual address. He dealt with the history of the organization and its possibilities.

Then followed papers by Ernest Wilby, of Detroit, read by the secretary, R. E. W. Hagarty, on "The Use of Concrete in the Dwelling-House"; by R. A. Plumb, Detroit, on "Waterproofing of Concrete"; and by Gustav Kahn, on "The Commercial Aspect of Reinforced Concrete in Canada." All papers were clever in their line, and were listened to with much attention.

The evening session was quite as interesting. Mr. F. S. Baker, of Toronto, read a paper on "The Use of Cement in Architecture," after which a very interesting discussion followed in which Messrs. John M. Moore, London; Gustav Kahn, Toronto; Wilson, Philadelphia; Young, Toronto; Lar-Philip, and Douglas, Iowa, and R. E. Holliday, Toronto, took part. "What Concrete Means to the Farmer," by Percy H. Wilson, of Phila-

delphia, was a most comprehensive review of the uses to be made of cement by the farmer and small user. The farmer had used but small quantities at first, but last year on the American side between five and eight millions of barrels had been used by the farmer. They had done much to popularize the cement industry.

Homes of Concrete. Then followed a paper by Mr. Milton Dana Morrill, of Washington, on "Inexpensive Homes of Concrete." Owing to the absence of Mr. Morrill, Mr. Hagarty, the secretary, read the paper. It was illustrated by scores of views, and all proved most interesting. Houses of four and five rooms could be built of concrete at a cost of from \$200 to \$300 a room.

The paper evoked much interest. The meeting closed shortly after 10 o'clock. The chair was occupied by Mr. Peter Gillespie, the president.
