HOME RULE BILL PASSES COMMITTEE; HOUSE ADJOURNS

Demonstrations in British Commons Marks Completion of an Important Stage.

GREAT OVATION FOR MR. ASQUITH

Mr. John Redmond Declares Union Jack Will Always Be the Flag of Ireland.

London, Dec. 12.—The committee stage of the home rule bill was completed in the House of Commons late tonight amid exciting demonstrations and counter demonstrations. The House then adjourned. Premier Asquith and his ministers were given an ovation as they left the chamber.

Mr. Hammersley (Unionist) moved a new clause providing that the Union Jack shall continue to be the official flag of Ireland after the measure passed. He also urged that the flag should be hoisted in a conspicuous place and kept flying over the building of the Irish Parliament each day while the Irish Parliament was in session. He urged that this clause would be a test of the sincerity of the Nationalists present professions of loyalty to the Empire, and he considered such a test also necessary, having regard to their past declarations. There ought to be one flag for the whole Empire. The clause was defeated by 130 of a majority. In the debate on the proposal to make it compulsory that the Union Jack should fly over the Irish Parliament building, Mr. Jeremiah MacVeagh, of South Down, in behalf of the Nationalists, spoke disparagingly of the Union Jack.

Mr. Balfour indignantly rebuked MacVeagh for the insult to the flag. He invited the House to take note of the use the United States make of the flag and reminded the Irish leader of how difficult he had made the realization of his hope of a loyal and contented Ireland, by the lessons of furious hatred of the flag which he and his colleagues for years had been teaching.

Mr. John Redmond replied in a speech full of loyal expressions, that the Union Jack would be flown in a contented Ireland when home rule was passed. He added that no doubt Ireland would have its own flag, but the two would be flown side by side.

FALL WAS FATAL

John Foster, of Wyoming, Was Hurlled From Auto.

In turning a street corner he was thrown out, along with the machine, and injured so badly that he died this afternoon at his home here.

PLEADED GUILTY

Sam Orenstein Is Wanted on Fraud Charges in Many Places.

LEG WAS CUT OFF.

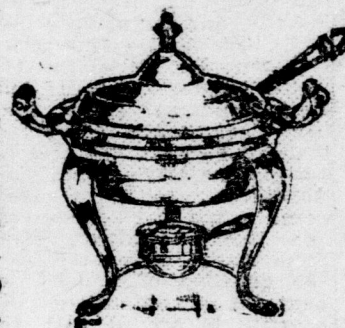
