

DECISIVE LIBERAL VICTORY IN SASKATCHEWAN PROVINCE MAJORITY BIGGER THAN EVER

Returns Show That the Scott Government Has Swept the Prairie Province on the Reciprocity Issue.

LATEST RETURNS GIVE LIBERALS 35; CONSERVATIVES, 10; DOUBTFUL, 7

Probable That the Government Will Have Over Forty Seats, a Majority Over Opposition at the Ratio of Five to One.

Regina, Sask., July 12.—Late returns from outlying constituencies today show an increased majority for the Scott Government. At noon the returns show Liberals 35, Conservatives 10, doubtful 2. The doubtful constituencies are Kindersley, Moose Jaw County, Morse, Pipestone, Flinto Creek, Quill Plains, Shellbrook. These may not be heard from in full for several days on account of the storms interfering with the telephone service, but little interest attaches to these doubtful results, so overwhelming has been Scott's victory. Press comment of the two party papers of Winnipeg sizes up the result that way.

SWEEPING VICTORY.

Speaking of the result, Dr. R. M. Simpson, president of the Winnipeg Conservative Association, said this morning that such a sweep is not good for the Government, admitting the same rule applies wherever there is no opposition, such a state of affairs tending to make the ministers autocratic.

Regina, July 12.—In the Provincial elections the later stages of which, at least, were fought out purely on Federal issues, Saskatchewan has returned Liberalism and Hon. Walter Scott to power by an overwhelming majority.

A POPULAR CRY.

Two things contributed most directly to the victory for the Liberals. The first was the possession of a popular cry in the reciprocity pact, and the second was the good administrative record of the Scott Government. The Regina Province, the chief Conservative organ in Saskatchewan, this morning publishes what it terms "The Decisive Liberal Victory" at the door of two things, viz., electoral crookedness and reciprocity. Leaving out of consideration the question of crooked work at the polls, for if there was any crooked work done it was done equally by both sides, that becomes a Conservative admission of the strength of the reciprocity appeal in Saskatchewan. Throughout the campaign the Conservative press and speakers derided the introduction of "Wider Markets" question into the Provincial arena, declaring reciprocity dead, and the issue not one which the elections could influence in any way.

Police Magistrate Judd Thinks \$1 Is Not Enough.

Police Magistrate Judd has given it forth to the world at large that he is tired of having batches of bicyclists before him every day for riding on sidewalks, and as the usual dollar fines have not had the desired effect, the scale is to be increased forthwith to \$2. This morning a dozen offenders were in court, while summons for an even greater batch are now awaiting service. As soon as these are disposed of the penalty is to be doubled, and if the bicyclists persist another increase will be made.

THOUSANDS PARADE AT BRANTFORD

Prominent Orangemen Address Annual Grand Gathering of the Order.

10,000 WALK AT TORONTO

Celebrations at Hamilton and Montreal and Kingston Has Biggest on Record There.

[Canadian Press.] Brantford, July 12.—Orangemen and their wives and friends to the number of 5,000 were given the freedom of the city here today by Mayor Hartman. From early morning heavily-loaded trains commenced to arrive, each containing bringing bands of its own. The city presented a lively appearance, the front streets being festooned with orange banners in commemoration of the 222nd anniversary of the Battle of the Boyne. Buffalo, St. Catharines, Hamilton, Galt, Dunnville, Woodstock, Ingersoll and London were strongly represented. An imposing parade of the Order of the Orange, led by the Hamilton and Montreal bands, entered the city at 10 o'clock, where E. T. Essery, London; Lieut.-Col. Belcher, Toronto; Dr. J. J. Williams, deputy grand master, Woodstock; Rev. J. M. Whitelaw, delivered addresses, following a welcome by Mayor Hartman. Ideal weather conditions prevailed for the celebration.

At Kingston. Kingston, July 12.—Probably the biggest Orange demonstration in the history of Kingston, known in years past as "The Derry of Canada," was that of today, when fully 5,000 Orangemen from district lodges all the way from Belleville to Brockville poured into the city by boat and train. Headquarters were at the city buildings, where the two historic halls were at the disposal of the Orange Order for registration and dinner, the local lodge's own hall on Princess street in itself not being adequate. The parade left the market square at 1:30, and was the largest that ever passed through the streets of the Kingston. The rendezvous was at Macdonald Park, where speeches were made from the pavilion by prominent lodgesmen from all over the district. The oldest Orangemen in the parade was John Elliott, of Kingston, who is in his 92nd year, and has been an Orangeman for 70 years. Another venerable member of the order of the Orange was the procession was Sir Mackenzie Bowell, K.C.M.G., who is in his 90th year. Mayor Hoag presided over the proceedings at Macdonald Park. Resolutions were passed, and the Orange Order in Canada, welcoming to Canada His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, and protesting against home rule for Ireland.

10,000 in Parade. Toronto, July 12.—Ten thousand Orangemen in the city of Toronto today joined in the local celebration of the anniversary of the Battle of the Boyne. The various lodges mustered in Queen's Park, and the streets leading thereto, and at 10:30 a grand procession and marched by a circuitous route to the exhibition grounds. Arrived at the end of the march refreshments were served, and at 2:30 Acting Mayor Church extended greetings of education, Rev. Canon H. C. Dixon, E. W. J. Owens, M.P.P., Dr. A. W. Thornton, J. S. Willison, J. P. Burnham, M.P.P., and Mr. W. D. McPherson, K.C., M.P.P. During the afternoon the younger members of the order took part in athletic contests.

Hamilton, July 12.—The "Glorious Twelfth" was quietly celebrated here today, Hamilton sending over seven hundred Orangemen to Brantford to take part in the big celebration there. The band of the Hamilton and the Ninety-First bugle and pipe bands, and with banners waving, the lodges made a brave showing as the parade swung up James street to the Hunter street station.

Montreal, July 12.—The Orangemen of this district celebrated the "Glorious Twelfth" by a picnic at Ste. Rosa. The weather being exceptionally pleasant a large crowd made the trip. The day was spent in sports, while addresses by prominent Quebec Orangemen were given during the afternoon.

DR. REAUME IS NOW MENTIONED

May Succeed Late Senator Wilson, of St. Thomas.

It was stated to the Advertiser today that Dr. Reaume, minister of public works, is slated for a senatorship, and may succeed the late Senator Wilson, of St. Thomas. There is said to be some talk of getting rid of Dr. Reaume from the Ontario Government, and it is felt by Conservative workers that it would be a good scheme to put him in the Senate, and thereby give the French-Canadians another French Senator from Ontario.

LONDON LIBERALS JUBILANT OVER SCOTT'S GREAT VICTORY

Reciprocity Is Still the Dominant Issue—Major Beattie Gives His Opinion.

That the reciprocity question is still a very live issue in Canada, Liberals have consistently believed since the defeat of the Laurier Government, but Conservatives have been forced to the admission by yesterday's results in Saskatchewan. Major Beattie, M. P. for London, being among those who does not today dispute the fact that the proposal for better trade relations between Canada and the United States swept the Scott Government to victory with an increased majority.

Liberals are jubilant and Conservatives and Conservative publications are apprehensive. It had been predicted in the pre-election news of both sides that a Liberal victory, with reciprocity the issue, in Saskatchewan would carry the greatest weight in the country, and the opinion is freely ventured that a very different story would remain to be told should the Laurier and Borden forces clash again.

They Want Reciprocity. Major Beattie is of the belief that the fact that the people of Saskatchewan "think they want reciprocity" carried the day for the Liberals in the election, and adds that it only remains for the Conservatives to disabuse the minds of the voters there.

The Rogers campaign did not have the desired effect, but apparently Conservatives did not hope that it would, he said.

Liberals Are Jubilant.

Several prominent Liberals and Con-

servatives were interviewed by The Advertiser as to the significance of yesterday's results, and while there is no jubilation in Conservative circles, both sides agree that reciprocity is solely and directly responsible for the great Liberal victory.

The Major's Idea. Major Beattie, the Conservative representative of London in the Dominion House, declared that the result was only what he expected. The Liberals, he said, are well organized, while the Conservatives are not in such a scattered province as Saskatchewan.

"False reports have been spread concerning reciprocity, and people think they want it out there," said the major. "Their minds have not been disabused as yet, but eventually the people will know better. We did not expect anything different from Saskatchewan because the Conservatives had no complete organization."

A Great Victory.

Mr. R. C. Struthers, the well-known wholesale baker at the D. S. Perrin factory, expressed the greatest pleasure at the victory of the Liberals in the Saskatchewan campaign.

"I think the result is very significant of the sentiment of the whole country," said he, "and in my opinion if another general election were called now, the result would be very different than in last September. The men of Saskatchewan were sharp enough to see to their own interests, and adds that the other border counties in Western Ontario made a big mistake in not adopting the same attitude on the reciprocity question when they had an opportunity. If Rogers had not done such service in this campaign in Saskatchewan, there would not have been a man of them left before the Liberals."

SAM LATTA'S FRIENDS ARE NOW SENDING CONGRATULATIONS

Former London School Teacher Wins Conservative Seat in Saskatchewan.

Many messages congratulating him on his victory in Last Mountain yesterday's election in Saskatchewan are being sent from London today to Mr. Sam J. Latta, formerly principal of the Colborne street school.

Mr. Latta, Liberal, opposed Mr. T. A. Anderson, Conservative, in a riding that at the last election gave a Tory majority of 300. The former London man, however, came through with a lead of 119. While in this city, Mr. Latta was known as a strong Liberal, but never aspired to office in Ontario.

Upon taking up his residence in Gordon, Sask., he established the Gowan Prairie News, and later added a couple of other papers in nearby towns. He is also interested in various other enterprises, being a large rancher.

ROGERS NO LONGER A WIZARD, HAS BECOME A FALLEN IDOL

Talk at the Capital Is That Having Failed to "Deliver the Goods" in Saskatchewan, Minister of Interior Will Hereafter Cut a Much Smaller Figure in Federal Affairs.

Ottawa, July 12.—The Saskatchewan election result is looked upon as a defeat for Hon. Robert Rogers. He gave an undertaking to his colleagues in the Government to deliver Saskatchewan to the Conservative party. He was given carte blanche to do anything which would achieve a victory. For this end the cement duties were cut in half, the lumber case was taken to the supreme court, political workers were put in wholesale as homestead inspectors, and a big political machine was set in motion in the province with unlimited funds. However, the "wider market" cry carried. Yesterday Mr. Rogers was a political wizard and today he is a fallen idol in the eyes of his colleagues. He has been more or less dominating the administration on the reputation he made in Manitoba provincial politics. It is openly stated today that he will hereafter cut a much smaller figure in federal affairs.

It is recognized here that Saskatchewan's declaration on the issues of the campaign will have a pronounced effect upon the course which each political party will pursue hereafter. Had the Conservatives won the trade issue would be dead and the Liberals down and out for years. With the Liberals victorious in the West they declare that they will go back to power in the next general election.

CROOKS STILL INFEST CARS

A Shoal of Sharks Appear To Be Using Old Games on the Public.

TRAINS ARE WORKED

Two More Cases Have Been Reported to the Authorities—How One Gang Was Fooled.

That the shoal of sharks, pickpockets and other varieties of well-dressed crooks that has swept over this part of the country for the past few weeks is still working regular trains, excursions, race meets and other crowds, was again made apparent at the Grand Trunk depot this morning, when numerous reports of "touches" were in circulation. The police have reason to believe that "dips" will be among the crowds at the London races this afternoon, and those who attend will consequently do well to be particularly careful of valuables.

While the thieves have worked the trains regularly since Dominion Day and for a few days before that holiday, only occasional reports have been received in the immediate vicinity of London this week. However, the Grand Trunk Detective Tisdale received authentic information today that two pickpockets were among the passengers on express No. 3 after leaving Brantford for London. The men were watched closely by the detective, but they managed to get away with themselves. They evidently suspected that they were being shadowed, however, and dropped off at London. They left the depot and have not since been heard from, although it is thought they will turn up at Queen's Park. They had been seen at the Fort Erie races and were en route to Windsor meet.
