WELSH BILL PASSES

London, Feb. 5.—The Welsh disestablishment bill passed its final reading in the House of Commons tonight, and was sent at once to the House of Lords.

Vigorous work by the Government whips brought a big attendance at the final reading in the Commons, and a motion to reject the bill on its third reading was defeated by a vote of 347 to 240.

The bill then passed its third reading without division. Later, it formally passed its first reading in the House of Lords.

POSTMEN BADLY BURNED SUFFRAGETTES BLAMED

Phosphorus Tubes in Letters Burst Into Flames at Dundee Post-office—Bernard Shaw Says Speaker Planned Coup on the Franchise Bill.

Dundee, Scotland, Feb. 5.—Five postmen were burned this evening, several of them quite seriously, by the combustion of chemicals contained in letters. One of the postmen, on returning from his evening collection of mail from the public letter boxes, emptied his bag on the sorting table at the postoffice. The contents instantly burst into flame. A large number of the envelopes contained tubes of phosphorus and other highly inflammable chemicals. They were addressed to Premier Asquith, and the sheets of paper within were inscribed: "Justice for women."

BLAMES THE SPEAKER

He Alone Responsible For the Withdrawal of the Franchise Bill.

London, Feb. 5.—At a meeting of non-militant suffragette societies in London tonight a letter was read from George Bernard Shaw, the playwright, in which he dissented from the suffragette view that the Government had broken faith with the women in withdrawing the franchise bill and attacking Speaker Lowther as the real offender. Mr. Shaw says the speaker was not only guilty of gross partiality, but that he concealed his coup from the Government until the last moment in order to discredit them and defeat the women at one stroke.

WOULD BAR RACING FROM ONTARIO FAIRS

Superintendent Wilson Declares War on Gambling and Games of Chance at Annual Meeting of the Provincial Fairs' Association.

Toronto, Feb. 6.—Standing field crop competitions received a large part of the discussion at the annual convention of the Ontario Association of Fairs and Exhibitions, held yesterday afternoon at the Forsters' Hall, 22 College street. On every hand this system of the fair was commended, and received high commendation and was reported as having splendid effects. President Dr. J. U. Simmons, of Frankfort, in his speech showed how, that through the prize winners and competitors it was made known where good seed grain might be secured. The report of J. Lockie Wilson, superintendent, showed that 150 agricultural societies had engaged in these competitions despite the bad season, and that there were 3,000 competitors, with an acreage of 30,000. The auction sale of this grain to the members of the societies and the distribution of the prize grain among the agricultural specialists in various localities were also good measures to raise the general quality of seed grain. Splendid results were shown by the fine quality of grain exhibited at the

In Ontario. The cost of experts should be obtained to give these lectures at say, Guelph, in the west, and Ottawa in the east.

In speaking of the standing field crop competitions he said that only the first 170 societies to apply would be allowed to take part, and that the first five prize-winners would be allowed to compete at the big shows. He spoke of the dishonest practice of entering into the competitions of more than one society by the same man.

In speaking of gambling and horse racing, he said that he was determined to stamp out the offenders under the act, and that he was not to be blamed if some societies were to lose their grants next year. Much difficulty had been experienced in getting convictions of gamblers from the magistrates, but the work would be continued.

He was in favor of allowing school children into the grounds free, as this helped the most needy of educational work. He also suggested that seats be supplied at all fairs for ladies. In closing he advised the giving of large prizes for grain, so that it might be kept by the societies and thus prevent the evil of showing the same grain year after year.

Township Exhibits. In the discussion which followed township exhibits were suggested and heartily approved as a means of stimulating interest and friendly rivalry. Many good suggestions were made by the district directors in their reports, among which were that photographs be made of extra fine exhibits. The societies were urged to solicit their M.P.'s for extra grants. Several novel competitions were suggested, such as milking and other farm duties. All were in favor of the field competitions.

In spite of the bad year, nearly all the societies seemed to be in a good condition, though the fairs in the larger centres seemed to be the hardest to keep up. This was perhaps because they apparently thought that greater special features were needed and thus entailed greater expense. Above all, it was shown to be necessary to secure good directors, and no men who regarded the position as an honorary one. Men who would work were needed.

The treasurer's report showed a satisfactory balance of \$324.94.

WINGHAM CHURCH WAS DESTROYED BY FIRE

\$7,000 Blaze in Baptist Church Probably Caused by Overheated Pipes.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Wingham, Feb. 5.—The Baptist Church was badly gutted by fire which broke out shortly before 6 o'clock this evening. Only the walls are standing.

The new organ installed about two years ago is badly damaged, but may be repaired. A new piano, only put in yesterday at a cost of \$200, is a heap of ashes. The loss is covered by insurance. The fire is believed to have started from overheated furnace pipes. Chief Dinsley and his men were on hand quickly after the blaze was noticed, but it had apparently been eating its way through the building for a long time, and had made such headway that nothing could be done. The loss will reach about \$7,000. Rev. G. V. Collins is the pastor. It is expected that a new and larger church will be erected as soon as possible.

ASKS FOR RECIPROCITY IN AUTO LICENSES

Ottawa Member To Introduce a Bill for Provincial Interchange.

Toronto, Feb. 6.—Inter-provincial reciprocity in automobile licenses will be made the subject of a bill this session, when Mr. J. A. Ellis, member for West Ottawa, will endeavor to have the House accept such a proposal. Reciprocity in licenses has been strongly urged by motorists for some time. They have asked not only for reciprocity between the Canadian provinces, but between Ontario and the States. The latter proposition has not, however, received a great deal of encouragement from the Government.

Mr. Ellis introduces his bill on behalf of the Ottawa branch of the Ontario Motor League. While the bill is for the benefit of motorists all over the province, it is particularly designed to remove a hardship on motorists at the capital, where traffic across the river into Quebec and from Quebec into Ottawa is very heavy.

The Ottawa member is not attempting to secure license reciprocity with the States.

WENT THROUGH ICE. Kingston, Feb. 5.—Joseph Knott, aged 12, son of Joseph Knott, caretaker of Queen's University, lost his life this morning while skating on the harbor near the Kingston Hosiery mill. The ice was very thin and he went through. The body has not yet been recovered.
