Miss Joyce Hutton and Mrs. Hope Gibson emerged victorious from the final of the Ontario Cup play yesterday afternoon on the local links, thus giving the honors evenly divided between Toronto and Hamilton for a night.

Sensational Play.

During the progress of the two matches there were as plentiful as brilliant golf, with the match between Miss Hutton and Miss Emsley as the most sensational of the play thus far. Miss Emsley was four down at the fifth, and the match at the 18th, and carried Miss Nesbitt to the 20th hole before the latter beat her, one up. Miss Emsley made a putt in from the edge of the green at the 18th, holding out in three to halve the match at that stage. The end was Miss Hutton's rubicon, and she paid a toll of 10 before she got safely over. Miss Nesbitt got off to a poor start in her match with Mrs. Gibson, taking even for the first hole. Mrs. Gibson went out in 43 to Miss Nesbitt's 47, and the match was even at the 10th hole. As Mrs. Gibson turned in an 84 card at the 18th, and Miss Hutton's 85 to the 20th hole, the latter again had the best of the day.

Miss Nesbitt furnished one of the finest bits of golf of the day, when she made the 18th on two. Miss Hutton's cup victory was preceded by a splendid performance in the driving competition, which she won with a total of 599 yards in three days. The approach and putting competition resulted in a four-cornered tie. Miss Snow, Rosedale, Miss Hutton, Mrs. A. L. Rodgers, Lambton, and Mrs. Wade, Hamilton, are the four, and they will settle the question this afternoon at 1:30.

The consolation rounds provided some splendid golf, as well as the prize competitions, and they had their share of the gallery again—a gallery that promises to be in the hundreds for today's final. Four of these matches were decided at the 18th hole, and one at the 20th. Miss Capreol beat Mrs. Gurney, one up, and Mrs. Wade beat Mrs. Lyle, one up. Miss McDonald beat Miss Nesbitt, seven and six. Miss Deeks beat Mrs. Cooper, three up.
