Vancouver, July 28.-Within eight and Alex. Paulson were granted a 12-hour stay of execution by the provincial attorney-general at midnight. Evidence that certain phases of the case had not been thoroughly canvassed by the federal depart ment of justice, in the consideration of the prisoners' plea for clemency. apparently has been adduced by ounsel for the condemned men. Some material in the case for Paulson's permanent reprieve did not reach the department at Ottawa.

The stay of execution, it is understood, is formally fixed at twelve hours to permit of further consideration today of the evidence submitted by counsel.

Further Amendment Permits All Traveling Expenses To Be Tabulated.

Sweeping changes in federal ncome tax regulations which vill affect thousands of residents of London and Western Ontario were announced at the office of the district income inspector Friday morning.

One important amendment to these egulations is that commencing in 1923, an exemption of \$300 will be allowed citizens for each child in the family, instead of the \$200 exemption at present in force.
