CANADA'S GROWTH MARVEL TO IRISH

Editor of Belfast Telegraph Gives Impressions of Tour Through Dominion.

To the mind of an Irishman the most outstanding feature of present-day Canada is the manner in which towns and cities develop so rapidly in this country. This view is expressed in the editor of the Belfast Telegraph, who was one of the party which recently toured the Dominion. In his paper he says: "Belfast folk are proud of the growth of their city, and boast of the fact that one hundred years ago it had a population of only 30,000, which today has advanced almost to half a million, a record of progress that, for the British Isles, is wonderful. But the Canadian would laugh at it. He would tell you of cases by the score where yesterday there was nobody and today there are thousands. Timmins, in Northern Ontario, is one of the most striking instances of rapid development that could be cited today. It is the do of the greatest gold camp in the do of bush; today it is a thriving place of 15,000 inhabitants. Not a trace of the old lumber town remains, but of substantial wooden structures that would put many an Irish town in the shade. Named After Brothers. "The town was named after two brothers named Timmins who foresaw the possibilities of the district as a gold region. There are various stories as to how they came to find gold, but the fact is that they are so contradictory that the truth is so deep down in the well or rather the mine, that it was more difficult to discover than gold. One story is that a lumberman kicked a piece of rock and found traces of the metal. "Timmins explodes all our youthful ideas of rough miners in rude shacks, hard-bitten, hard-drinking, revolver-shooting desperadoes, who would dig up nuggets of gold. It is a busy little town with an assessed value of over one million pounds, duplicate high pressure waterworks system, complete sewerage and disposal plant. There are modern shops, wholesale establishments, good hotels, three theatres, four banks, paved and asphalted streets, miles of concrete walks, five bridges, five churches, and eight schools. Output Tremendous. "On the outskirts is the gold mine of the Hollinger Consolidated. Company, Limited, the foundations of which were laid by the Timmins Brothers. It is the largest of some twenty mines in a forty-mile area, which supplies over 75 per cent of the Dominion's total output of gold. In the last sixteen years supply of gold to the world's market has been enriched by the world's supply of gold to the extent of \$23,000,000, which has yielded the shareholders over \$7,000,000. "The Porcupine mines are producing gold at the rate of five million pounds a year, and the man from Timmins declares that the surface has hardly been scratched as yet. Want of capital alone prevents the development of other promising properties. It is truly a wealthy land around Timmins, for it has proven supply of nickel, barite, asbestos, and other minerals. "A few observations on the gold mining industry of Ontario generally will not be out of place, and will perhaps contain something new for those who have hitherto associated gold with the Rand and Western Australia. As a matter of fact Canada is the largest gold-producing country in the world, and the vast bulk of it comes from this Northern Ontario region. Opened by Railroads. "It was the building of the C. P. R. main line across the continent in 1883 that exposed the vast nickel-copper deposits of the Sudbury area. History repeated itself, for it was the construction of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario line that led to the discovery of the world-famed silver deposits of Cobalt in 1903, and indirectly to the great gold field of Porcupine six years later. It was the intense prospecting following the Cobalt discoveries that found Porcupine. These hardy men spread out from the line of railway as it extended northward to Cobalt, now a town of 2,200 inhabitants, and made successive discoveries of gold-bearing

Toronto's Drive For \$150,000 of Beck Fund Is Under Way

Spirit of Sacrifice Which Enriched Life of Noted Humanitarian Pervades Opening Ceremony in Endowment Campaign—Objective Is Half-Million Dollars.

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, Nov. 20.—The Toronto campaign to raise \$150,000 of the \$500,000 which is to perpetuate the name of Sir Adam Beck in the endowment of his beloved Queen Alexandra hospital for the tubercular, was launched at a big luncheon tonight. Speakers pointed out that the fund to be raised is not for capital expenditure or to take care of past deficits, which have always been looked after through Sir Adam's efforts, but is for the specific purpose of insuring that the hospital's doors may always remain open for indigent tubercular citizens of Ontario. Interest from its investment is to meet the \$3 per day per capita cost of caring for tubercular people who have no money.

That Sir Adam himself would have chosen just the memorial that is being undertaken was indicated tonight in address after address from public-spirited Toronto businessmen, who gathered for the final organization touches on the eve of the campaign.

DRASTIC MEASURE TO IMPROVE BEES

Perth Keepers Will Burn All Infected Hives—Saving of \$3,000 Yearly.

Stratford, Nov. 20.—Foul brood among bees will be stamped out in Perth county next spring if drastic action planned by the government is as successful here as it has been in other centers. This pest each year takes a toll of between \$3,000 and \$4,000 in bees. Every infected hive in the county will be burned.

ing one of which Porcupine was the greatest, followed by Kirkland Lake, seventy miles S.E., in 1912. The location of these areas changed the status of gold mining in Ontario from one of insignificant proportion to one that excited the attention of the mining world. Last year the Porcupine field produced \$4,271,106 worth of gold, which was \$6.2 per ounce of the total output of the province, Kirkland Lake supplying the balance. "In the first six months of the present year gold production in Canada reached a new record of \$24,943,000, as compared with 700,264 ounces in the same period last year. Ontario continued to lead the world, with 791,114 fine ounces, as compared with 571,418 ounces in the first half of 1924. From the Porcupine field the production amounted to \$7,486,000, or nearly 82 per cent of the total for Ontario, while Kirkland Lake produced 126,477 ounces or 18 per cent."

SOCIAL HYGIENE EXHIBIT IS OPENED

Alarming Spread of Social Diseases Revealed in Pictorial Form.

TO EDUCATE PUBLIC
First Half of Week For Men—Last For Women.

Remarkable exhibits in the interests of social hygiene were given in rooms at the Royal Bank building yesterday under the auspices of the Canadian Social Hygiene council. Two private showings were held preliminary to the general exhibition of next week, commencing Monday. It is to advocate the knowledge and practice of social hygiene as the one way to racial improvement, and to prevent through the spreading of informative propaganda, the now alarming growth of venereal diseases, that the federal and provincial departments of health have granted large sums of money.

More than sixty-five London women, officers of various women's organizations, attended the display yesterday afternoon, and in the evening the exhibit was open for men. Posters and circulars, not intentionally of an alarming nature, but grippingly impressive in the presentation of authentic facts, were displayed, as well as a number of lifelike wax models, manufactured by Parisian artists. These form a comprehensive outline of the growth of the two major venereal diseases, gonorrhea and syphilis. It is revealed that as a public health problem these diseases are as important as tuberculosis or cancer.

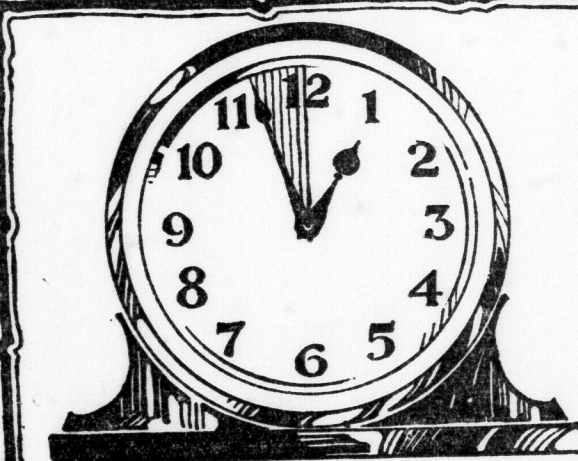
Week Divided.

During the first half of next week the exhibits, under the supervision of local doctors, will open to men, and for the last three days, women of the city will have an opportunity of visiting the social hygiene rooms at the Royal Bank building. Nurses of the Victoria Hospital are to attend several lectures, which will be illustrated by the hygiene posters and models. They will have charge of the display for the latter half of the week.

The exhibit is in charge of Miss Estelle Hewson, Ontario secretary of the Canadian social hygiene council, and Mrs. Ames Haygarth, social service nurse of the provincial department of health.

Mortality Rate High.

Miss Hewson explained the surprising mortality rate of syphilis in comparison with other death-causing scourges, such as tuberculosis, pneumonia and cancer. The venereal diseases caused the loss of many more lives than other better-known diseases, she said, mortality statistics showing that in a death-rate of 100,000, syphilis was responsible for 222, cancer 131, pneumonia 88, influenza 28, and typhoid fever 13.
