A VENTURE IN LUMBER.

Five Million Feet to Be Rafted from Portland to San Francisco.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 28.—Within the next few months a raft containing 5,000,000 feet of lumber will be constructed in this city and towed to San Francisco by the firm of Inman and Poulson, owners of a large lumber interest here. The raft will be 350 feet long and 35 feet wide. Several rafts of piling have been towed from the Columbia river to San Francisco, but traffic in sawed lumber is a new undertaking.

PELUCIAN HOMICIDE CASE.

The Victim Refuses Evidence in Gratitudo for Past Favours.

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—John Healy died today in a hospital from the effects of stab wounds inflicted by George H. Pelucian. The circumstances of the homicide are peculiar and only became known today. Healy had been out of town for some time. Lincoln, who is married, befriended him and the two men were the best of friends. On Christmas day Lincoln entered his home intoxicated and threatened to strike his wife. Healy pleaded for her and the woman ran into another room. When she returned, after hearing sounds of a struggle, she found Healy covered with blood. Her husband had gone to the hospital and brought to Healy's bedside. Healy positively denied that he had ever seen Lincoln, and he died today, refusing to implicate the man who had befriended him. Lincoln was recommended to wait the action of the coroner's jury. He will probably be charged with homicide.

JAPAN SENTS A WAR.

Her Navy Sent Out Fully Equipped and Ready for a Battle to Begin.

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—A special despatch from Shanghai dated yesterday says: "It is reported that Japanese war vessels are waiting near Goto island, and are ready to start on their expedition to Korea." The Japanese fleet, which includes the *Amatsukabe* and *Fuji*, two of the finest vessels in the Japanese navy, and the *Chen Yuen*, which was captured from China. The Japanese fleet, it is understood, is acting in close touch with the British squadron under Vice-Admiral Sir Alexander Buller, commander-in-chief of the China station. Japan will certainly oppose a permanent occupation by Russia of Port Arthur. The sudden dissolution of the Japanese diet was due to the war spirit. It is expected that the Japanese fleet will attempt to prevent the landing of reinforcements from Odessa for the protection of the Russian trans-Asiatic railway in Manchuria.

KNOCKOUT BY MINISTERS.

Those of Buffalo Secure a Decision Against, Give Consent.

BUFFALO, Dec. 28.—Justice John Woodard this afternoon gave his decision in the proceedings instituted by Rev. Byron H. Sawyer and eleven ministers to stop a pro-union strike in this city. The decision is a victory for the ministers so far as it sustains their contention that the tickets for local prize fighting were sold without actual regard to club membership. An appeal will be taken from Justice Woodard's decision.
