C., Aug. 13.—Consul-General Gudger writing to the state de-partment under date of July 29, reports that on July 26 and 27, about 25 revo-lutionists entered the towns of Gatun, Behol and San Pablo, on the line of the Panama railroad, midway between Panama railroad, midway between Panama and Colon, made prisoners of the Alcalde and several policemen, and retired to the mountains taking with them what arms and provisions they could find. He says reports were cur-rent of revolutionary gatherings at other points and an attack on Panama was feared.
