Japanese Advance Against Mukden Is Rapidly Taking Form.

Enemy Offering a Stubborn Resistance to First Movements.

Anxiety as to Port Arthur Is Now Slightly Relieved by Late Reports.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 22.—The Japanese operations against Mukden are rapidly developing. General Kurapatkin announces that the Japanese army at Bentapsatz is beginning to advance northward. The outpost yesterday tried to capture Kaouton pass commanding the road to Fushan. The Russians are offering a stubborn resistance, which is likely to retard the Japanese advance.
