## TO BRING IMMIGRANTS TO N. B.

Salvation Army Will Hereafter Pay

More Attention to the Maritime

Provinces

ST. JOHN, Oct. 23.—While the pro-

vincial immigrant department con-

tinues bringing settlers to this pro-

vince, the Salvation Army are ar-

ranging to place thousands of settlers

in Canada during the coming win-

ter season. The army took a prom-

inent part in this work last year,

nearly fifteen thousand settlers being

brought to Canada. Of this number,

only about five thousand settled in

this province.

Col. Turner stated this morning

that the army would carry on the

work on a larger scale during the

winter season. Particular efforts will

be made to induce the immigrants to

locate in New Brunswick and the other

Maritime Provinces. It has been

the custom for the army to charter

steamers from the companies and ac-

quire the privilege of bringing the im-

migrants here in parties. Staff Cap-

tain Jennings will again have charge

of the army immigration work. He

will visit this city in a few days
