Ottawa, June 1, 1911—Judgements were handed down in the Supreme Court of Canada to-day in the following New Brunswick cases. Crockett vs. Town of Campbellton, appeal dismissed with costs, the Chief Justice and Justice Anglin dissenting. This case was appealed before the N. B. Supreme Court. W. K. McKean vs. The Dalhousie Lumber Co., appeal dismissed with costs. The case of Crockett vs. Town of Campbellton has been twice before the Court at Dalhousie and was won by the plaintiff and twice before the New Brunswick Supreme Court when the defendants won on appeal.

Permits For Building Issued Showing 'a Value Of \$200,000.

The following figures, taken from the Building Inspector's Records, may give us a fair idea of the progress made in rebuilding the town. Although the contractors have for various reasons not peen so much overwhelmed with work as they expected, still the buildings are going on, the spirit of energy displayed since last July being well maintained.

From April 20th to May 31st there were issued 85 permits. For the month of May alone there were issued 57 permits. In April the value of the 28 permits issued vas \$31,190 and for May \$168,700 a full total for the month and a alf of \$199,890.

It may be noted in passing that of these permits only 4 were for brick and concrete construction One part of the Inspector's report. does not make such good reading as unfortunately applications for permits were refused showing a ailding value of \$30.500.
