There are between 50 and 60 dairies in the Townshap of York which send their milk to the city for sale. Now, why not license these dairies and have the fees resulting from this source go towards paying a competent veterinary surgeon to inspect and report on each dairy at least once a month? What applies to York Township will apply with perhaps more force to outside districts where the dairies are not visited by an inspector of any kind, and would it not be wise for our citizens to render assistance to the Local Board of Health so that it may be able to get such legislation as may be necessary to get such legislation as may be necessary to have this dread disease stamped out? Our neighbors to the south of us are getting legislation. European countries are getting legislation, and why should we be behind in matters which interface as much with

our social welfare?

I have noticed recently by several writers that at least 3 per cent. of the dairy cattle of this country suffer from tuberculosis. If such be the case is it not high time our If such be the case is it not high time our legislators appoint a commission to enquire into this matter? They have given attention to matters of far less importance to the general public. For instance, the Dehorning Commission was in my humble opinion a great big farce and money thrown away without anyone being benefited by it. No one's health will be affected whether the cover are denoured or not, but the hare idea. one's health will be affected whether the cows are dehorned or not, but the bare idea of 3 per cent. of our neat cattle suffering from a dread disease such as tuberculosis and to think of intelligent human' beings eating flesh and drinking milk of this kind is something terrible. Why, we are informed that even pigs that drink the milk of tuberculosed cows contract the disease. I am also informed by one of our best pathologists that taking a small quantity of milk from one of these tubercular cows and injecting it into a guinea pig that it and injecting it into a guinea pig that it will produce the disease in a remarkably short time.
