Seize Power Launch, Two Trucks and Coupe.

LIQUOR AND DOPE TAKEN

Five Placed Under Arrest In New York State.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Nov. 12.—Late last night coastguardsmen and customs inspectors surrounded an alleged band of rum-runners and narcotic smugglers by land and water and arrested five men, one a Canadian, and seized a 35-foot power launch, two trucks and a coupe, 100 cases of ale and a small quantity of cocaine on the shore of Lake Ontario, at Orléans, just east of Sea Breeze. The arrests and seizure took place without a shot being fired.

COAL SHORTAGE SERIOUS

Claimed Women and Children Freezing To Death In New England

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Women and children are freezing to death in New England because of the coal shortage, E. W. Goss, representing the New England Governors' Fuel Commission, said today.

He was testifying at the opening of a hearing before Interstate Commerce Commissioner Campbell to determine what measures should be taken by the Interstate Commerce Commission to provide lower railroad rates on bituminous coal.

Termining the present hard coal strike "the biennial farce," Mr. Goss painted a graphic picture of conditions which, he said, had resulted in New England from the coal shortage.

LABOR HAS FRIEND IN RAILWAY HEAD

Sir Henry Thornton Favors State-Owned Railway.

DAILY HERALD INTERVIEW

Service As Efficient As By Privately-Owned System.

SPECIAL Cable To The Free Press. LONDON, Nov. 12.—Labor has found a good friend in Sir Henry Thornton, who has arrived here on a business trip. The Daily Herald gives special prominence to an interview with the Canadian railwayman in which he declares "it has been demonstrated that state-owned railways as represented by the Canadian National can and do furnish efficient service quite up to that given by a privately-owned system. Officers and men of the Canadian National, he said, take the utmost interest and pride in the organization they serve. Sir Henry said that the Canadian wage scale was relative higher than the rate obtaining in Britain and that the standard of living is better. The years' yearnings of the Canadian National will break all records, added Sir Henry, who concluded the interview by saying:

"I have always had the pleasant relations with labor and never has a laboring man, a labor leader or a labor organization let me down."

The Herald naturally uses this interview as part of their advocacy for nationalization and in its heading of the interview it says "The railway that belongs to the people. Thornton tells that state ownership is a triumph for Canada."

HEAR TESTIMONY IN COAL MINE DISPUTE
Several Aspects Covered At Sitting Of Royal Commission In Nova Scotia.

SYDNEY, N. S., Nov. 12.—Testimony covering several aspects of the coal mining industry of Nova Scotia was presented yesterday to the royal commission which is now inquiring into the entire operation of the British Empire Steel Corporation, its relations with the employees and the living conditions of the workers in the mining districts. The commission is headed by Sir Andrew Rae Duncan, who was appointed at the behest of Premier E. N. Rhodes, of Nova Scotia, by the British Government, the other members being Major Hume Cronyn, K. C., of London, Ont., and Dr. H. P. MacPherson, rector of St. Francis Xavier University, St. David's.

Four witnesses were called by the commission yesterday—all miners. They gave evidence with regard to the wages and living conditions. The miners expect to call 30 or 40 more witnesses.

WINDSOR AND SANDWICH TOWNSHIPS APPEAL ON RATES FIXED FOR GAS

TORONTO, Nov. 12.—The City of Windsor and the Township of Sandwich East appeal to a divisional court from a decision of the board of gas reference, fixing rates to be paid to the Union Gas Company.

The appellants complain that the finding was contrary to the evidence and also that the finding made no allowance for the fact that the gas company is a mining company and that it has exhausted 80 per cent. of the gas for which its capital investment was made.

LEFT HAND AMPUTATED

Joseph Cook, of Embro, Victim of Accident on Son's Farm.

WOODSTOCK, Nov. 12.—Joseph Cook, of Embro, had his left hand amputated at the Woodstock General Hospital today as the result of a painful accident he sustained on the farm of his son, William Cook, when he had his hand caught in the machinery of a chipping box.

He was reaching for a nut which was loose when his mitt was caught in the machinery, and before it could be stopped his whole hand had been drawn into it and twisted almost completely off at the wrist.

He was rushed to the Woodstock Hospital, where the injured member had to be amputated.

KINTORE CHURCH DEPRIVED OF VOTE

Property Commission Condemns Action of Minister and Session

AUTOMATIC ENTRY TO UNION

Commission Powerless; Agree Minority Have Rights

TORONTO, Nov. 12.—(Canadian Press Dispatch).—Members of the Ontario church property commission are unanimous in condemnation of the action of Rev. Dr. MacDonald and the session of Kintore Presbyterian Church in refusing the request of the minority to call a meeting until too late to take a vote on church union.

As a result the church went automatically into the United Church of Canada.

The question of union was brought up in the Kintore church, Nisour Township, County of Middlesex, in December, 1924, when it was resolved that a vote should be taken at the annual meeting in January. Following the latter meeting it was resolved that the church should enter union without a vote. The decision was taken after the benediction, and the Presbyterian minority declared the meeting not to

be a congregational one, but merely a "little meeting," or a feater to ascertain the feeling of the congregation. In April the minority filed a request for a vote. The session, by a vote of five to three, decided to take full advantage of the 30 days of grace from the date of the petition, and though it was pointed out to do this would deprive the minority of the right of holding a vote, the course was persisted in.

"The entries," says Chairman J. D. Falconbridge, "speak for themselves. We accept the 30 days of grace" should be translated, "We take advantage of the period of 30 days and appoint a day so near the end of June that it will be impossible to take a vote at all and in this way will, without doing anything illegal, deprive the persons who signed the requisition of their right to insist that a vote be taken place."

"At least one witness for the respondents admitted frankly that this action was taken deliberately in order to avoid the taking of a vote, but the moderator of the session admitted it only reluctantly as the result of vigorous cross-examination."

W. H. Wardrope, K. C., commissioner representing the United Church, and R. S. Cassels, commissioner representing the Presbyterian Church, referred scathingly to the action of the minister and session. Mr. Cassels states "the action of the session was illegal and the requisitioning members were improperly deprived of the right to have a vote."

The chairman and Mr. Wardrope agree that the commission is powerless to make any recommendation under the section of the act dealing with irregularity in voting, as no vote by ballot was taken and the church went auto-

matically into union. They agree that the minority should be allowed the use of the Kintore Presbyterian Church free of charge from 2 to 5 o'clock on Sunday afternoon for two years, from December 31 next. Mr. Cassels would give the minority the Methodist church, which is the smaller and less valuable of the two.


