THE LATE JOSEPH CRONE

On Tuesday, April 5th 1921, death
removed one of the best known and
highly esteemed pioneers of this dis-
trict in the person of Mr. Joseph
Crone, who passed peacefully away
at the home of his daughter, Mrs.
Peter Bearss, Arkona, in his 81st
year.

The deceased was born in Whitby
Ont., Sept. 28, 1840, and when a boy
of 13 years came with his parents to
Bosauquet, where they settled.

In 1862 Mr. Crone was married to
Miss Barbara Nelson, of Bosauquet,
who predeceased him ten years ago.
About 50 years ago he moved to
Warwick township where he lived
until ten years ago when he went to
spend the rest of his days with his
daughter in Arkona. While in War-
wick he devoted his energies to
farming and took great pride in his
business. He took considerable inter-
est in educational matters and was
sec-treas. of S. S. No. 4 for 32
years. He was a life-long Methodist
and deeply interested in all religious
movements. He leaves behind two
daughters and one son. Mrs. Peter
Bearss of Arkona; Mrs. D. W.
Hossie of Vancouver, and Frank
Crone of Regina; also two brothers,
Thomas of Winnipeg, and Francis of
Mandaunin.

The funeral took place on Satur-
day afternoon, service being held in
Bethel Church by Rev. C. L. L.
Couzens. Interment in Bethel ceme-
tery. The funeral was largely attend-
ed. The pallbearers were H. Smith,
W. C. Hill, J. L. Fuller, P. Ander-
son, T. Pressy and H. Zavitz.

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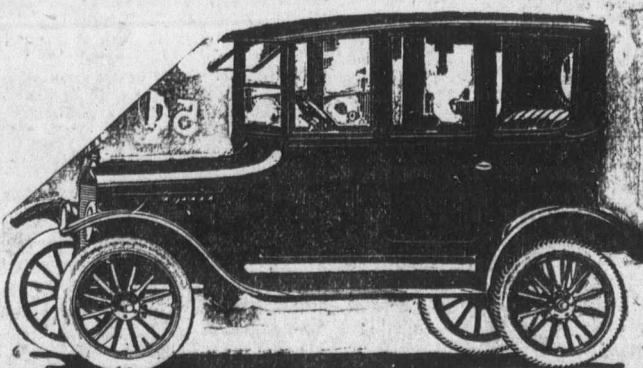
