PREFACE.

THE ten Lectures of which this volume is composed were delivered at St. John's Wood, England, to an audience of young people, who were so deeply interested that the author was induced to publish the addresses that they might be a source of pleasure to a wider circle of young people, and at the same time awaken in them a love of nature and of the study of science.
