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TOULOUSE GESE.

In no class of our domestic poultry is there so much room for improvement as in geese—that is in the hands of those who raise them for the profit derived from their flesh and feathers. It is very unsatisfactory to know that now, when there is an opening for a lucrative trade in poultry with Eng-land, that we are not in a position, from the inferior quality of our geese, to place but a small quantity on the market. Shippers tell us that there is no comparison between the geese sent from this country and those raised in England, and that it is useless to ship such stock as is generally raised
