The Patrons' Medical Bill.

WE subjoin a letter from Dr. Ryerson, M.P.P., which deals with this most important bill, which is now before the Legislature. It is hardly possible to conceive that any Government could give its countenance to a bill so fraught with danger to the public, and which constitutes such a violation of the rights of the profession, yet were no protest to be entered amendments to the existing Act might be passed which would be prejudicial to all, and which might be very difficult to remove. We would urge upon every member of the profession to exert himself by protesting, through the representative of his constituency, or directly on the Government, against a measure which is so contrary to the interests of the public and the profession.
