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CANADA-FRENCH COMMUNITY OF BELGIUM PRIZE AWARDED TO
WRITER EUGÈNE SAVITZKAYA

The Department of External Affairs and the Canada Council announced that the Belgian writer Eugène Savitzkaya has been awarded the 1985 Canada-French Community of Belgium Prize. The prize, worth \$2,500, is awarded in alternate years to a Canadian or a Belgian francophone writer. The jury's decision is based on an assessment of the author's overall contribution to literature rather than on an individual work.

The prize is administered by the Canada Council and Canadian financing is through the Cultural Affairs Division, Arts Promotion, of the Department of External Affairs.

The winners are selected by a jury appointed by the Ministry of the French Community of Belgium and by the Canada Council. This year, the Canadian jury was composed of Marie-Claire Blais, Victor-Lévy Beaulieu, Jacques Brault and François Charron, under the chairmanship of Naïm Kattan.

Eugène Savitzkaya was born in 1955 at Saint-Nicolas-lez-Liège of a Russian mother and a Polish father. His literary career started early; while still in high school, he published two works and participated actively in a Liège literary group called L'Atelier de l'Agneau. Since 1977, he has published novels and collections of poems in which his slavic background is revealed through his particular narrative style.

Among his literary works are *Mentir* (1977), *La traversée de l'Afrique* (1979), *Les couleurs de boucherie* (1980) and *La disparition de maman* (1982).

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
