Some few years ago I asked a question about the Department of Reconstruction and Supply; I asked what the daily releases of this department cost, and here is the answer I got:

No daily press releases are issued by the Department of Reconstruction and Supply but releases are issued, however, at irregular intervals whenever it is considered necessary to do so. As the preparation of these releases is only one of the many functions of the publicity branch, and as other branches are involved in the preparation and distribution, it is not readily possible to determine the exact cost.

Mr. ILSLEY: What was the document the hon. gentleman placed on *Hansard*?

Mr. FRASER: It was a list of the publications issued by the wartime information board and Canadian information service.

Mr. ILSLEY: I just want to point out that that would have to be with unanimous consent.

Mr. ILSLEY: I am not objecting to this, but I am disturbed at the increasing tendency on the part of hon. members to hand in documents as part of their speeches. At some stage we shall have to draw the line.

Mr. FRASER: I am quite willing to read it, although it will take me five minutes or so. Is it all right to have it on?

Mr. ILSLEY: As far as I am concerned.

Mr. GRAYDON: This looks like a proper case.

Mr. ILSLEY: I have no objection to this, but we should draw the line somewhere.

Mr. GRAYDON: The government is the worst offender.

Mr. ILSLEY: That is a different matter.

Mr. GRAYDON: There is no difference.

Mr. ILSLEY: Yes, there is.

Mr. FRASER: I was talking about the reconstruction department and the answer that was given to me in regard to their releases. I might say that when these releases are not sent out the reconstruction department does not forget you. Here is a sealed envelope addressed to me by the Department of Reconstruction and Supply. You can hold
