International Youth Year, it is part of my responsibility to celebrate this year despite the problems facing youth today. GOVERNMENT POSITION

Mr. Lorne Nystrom (Yorkton-Melville): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Minister of Employment and Immigration.

According to Statistics Canada this morning, there are now more people unemployed than there were three months ago, and we all know that the Progressive Conservative Party was elected on September 4 of this year.

I just want to know what this Government is going to do to create new jobs today. What does it intend to do now to create jobs for the unemployed in this country?

Hon. Flora MacDonald (Minister of Employment and Immigration): Mr. Speaker, the Hon. Member obviously was not paying attention when I responded to a similar question just a few minutes ago. For his benefit I will repeat what I said then. Perhaps it will get through to him this time.

As I mentioned, there have been 65,000 people added to the workforce in the last two months. There are 70,000 new jobs which will be created by the Canada Works Program which we announced earlier this year. The highest amount is dedicated to Canada Works during the winter period. That will bring the jobs into creation at the very time they are most needed. I am sure the Hon. Member knows that the deadline for those projects was earlier this month.

Oral Questions LEVEL OF UNEMPLOYMENT

Mr. Lorne Nystrom (Yorkton-Melville): Mr. Speaker, there are more people unemployed now than there were when the Conservative Party took office three months ago, and 50,000 more than last month. What is the Minister going to do now for those additional unemployed people?

Hon. Flora MacDonald (Minister of Employment and Immigration): Mr. Speaker, it is really not possible to add \$430 million to the Canada Works Program every month. That is just not possible, although the Hon. Member might think that is the way to go about it. He should look at what that program will indeed do, beginning with the 70,000 new jobs that will be brought onstream this month as a result of the \$430 million already allocated. We have done that despite the fact that it was not budgeted for by the previous Government and certainly had not been planned. We have moved to make sure—

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REQUEST FOR MINISTERIAL ACTION

Hon. Flora MacDonald (Minister of Employment and Immigration): Mr. Speaker, it does seem very difficult to get through to the Hon. Member.

Miss MacDonald: I have told him that there is \$430 million allocated to bring on jobs beginning this month—that is, the months of December, January and February. Seventy thousand new jobs will be created, beginning this month.
