## Oral Questions

I want to ask the government again: When will it take its head out of the sand and do something for the home building industry in this country and for home buyers who are waiting to buy their first homes?

Hon. John McDermid (Minister of State (Finance and Privatization)): Mr. Speaker, the mortgage rates today are at the lowest they have been in six or seven years. That is the best way we can help people to buy homes. Every time interest rates drop one percentage point, thousands of Canadians become eligible to put their down payments to buy homes.

Interest rates have dropped 5.5 per cent in the last year and that is the most important thing we can do for the home building industry.

## ATLANTIC MARINE INDUSTRY

Mr. Ron MacDonald (Dartmouth): Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Minister of Transport. It concerns a report from his own department which recommends a user fee be charged to all vessels visiting Atlantic Canadian ports for navigational aid use.

Quite simply, this is just yet another tax which will further cripple the competitiveness of the Atlantic marine industry.

My question is: Will the minister guarantee in this House today that he will under no circumstances implement this new tax on the marine industry in Atlantic Canada?

Hon. Jean Corbeil (Minister of Transport): Mr. Speaker, as the member knows, a user fee policy was introduced and put to consultation by the transportation department last year. After receiving all the input of the different stakeholders in that industry, we are at the present time reconsidering the situation and will make our final proposal known pretty soon.

I would like to give him more assurances in other areas, but I will only be able to do that when the CBC does a similar flattering profile on me.
