### Revival of Racing Next Year in France

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—A revival of racing in France may be expected next year, according to the announcement in the November Racing Calendar to the effect that the Grand Prix de Paris to be run in 1916 and 1917 will be worth 200,000 francs if, as the conditions state, circumstances permit, and the customary year of the race meetings. The value of the Grand Prix is decreased by one-third, which is taken to mean that the French Jockey Club believes that when racing is once established it will quickly resume its former success in France.

### Trotting Working Out For Ice Meets

Triple Schedule Will Be In Effect—Players Getting Ready for Opening.

The Manitoba Amateur Hockey Association is going to have hockey this year and six clubs are going to play, but the association is going to see that the patriotic funds get a fair percentage of the receipts, whether there is any money made or not. Monarchs, Pags, Vics, Falcons and two soldier teams will compose the series.
