mind, I am fully perfuaded, that he is fo engaged; as I would not prefume the minuteft want of difcretion in our miniftry, or that they would fet the fate of this crown and kingdom on a lefs hazard, fo neither fhould I merit credit in this particular, did I not propofe to fupport thefe fugeftions by certain facts.

There has long been a real, or feeming difference between the courts of London and Berlin, the grounds of which, and the caufe of its continuance, is not immediately to my prefent purpofe; but it may not be impertinent to fhew how a change has been brought about as introductory to the prefent fyftem.

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It is fome few years paft, that a certain noble perfonage, fince removed to another court, in a free conversation with his P—n M—y, hinted the neceffity and use of a friendly union, not only between the respective electorates, but also with the court of L—n, as the most natural means of putting a full stop to the encroachments and over-bearing power of France, which by degrees would probably as much endanger Germany hereafter, as it did now the Austrian Netherlands.
