

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

LACK OF POWER TIES UP HAMILTON FACTORIES

Street Railway and Interurban Lines Blocked—Steam Railways Feel Effect of Blizzard.

HAMILTON, Feb. 14.—(Special)—The snow storm which commenced last night in a mild snow fall and followed up this morning with a heavy snow fall, increased to-night to a terrific gale, and since dark set in the whole city has been completely at the mercy of the elements. Thru lack of power no factories worked to-day, the newspapers published under difficulties, and indications all point to the continuation of the tie-up for a couple of days.

Early this morning the street railway and the interurban lines were blocked. A car from the street railway on the Dundas line about 9 o'clock and no more were sent out on any lines after it was replaced on the rails. By 8 o'clock to-night the street railroads started to feel the effects of the blizzard. Trains 12 and 17 westbound on the T. H. & D. and M.C.R. lines to London were cancelled, and all other trains were running away off schedule. On the Grand Trunk the evening train for Jarvis and Port Dover was started going up the mountain. It ran back to the city and a steam rotary sent out to clear the road jumped the track at Ferguson-avenue and Wilson-street. It was replaced without any damage having been done. All Grand Trunk trains are late. So far the telephone and telegraph companies have had little trouble.

He was glad to see the vote of 100,000 towards the bicentenary fund and last night he would go long way in this direction. But he prophesied that his honorable friend, G. H. Ferguson from Grenville, would live to regret the motion he had introduced regarding bilingual schools.

Sir James Whitney rose to protest that it was clearly contrary to the elementary rules of procedure to refer to a subject which was already on the order paper. It should not be discussed at that order of business was reached.

Treatment of North Country. A. Aubin, French Conservative member from Sturgeon Falls, contrasted the treatment accorded to the north country under Liberal and Conservative rule.

While the farmers were admittedly prosperous, the conditions of labor called for amelioration. The prosperous Ontario farmer was aided by the government last year to the extent of \$90,000. Many of the best immigrants speedily passed owing to the greater inducements offered. This could be remedied by a wiser and more liberal policy towards the hinterland of Ontario.

Mr. Donovan Irate. A. E. Donovan, with some warmth, protested against the expressions of the member for East Hamilton, especially in saying that some of the members acted as if their main desire was to get grants for their ridings sufficient to insure their re-election. This Mr. Donovan emphatically denied.

Mr. Studholme convulsed the house by declaring that Mr. Donovan probably knew less upon the question than any other member of the house. He was personally convinced that Hon. Col. Matheson was a careful treasurer and was unable to do more for New Ontario owing to the persistence of members from Old Ontario for local grants.

Doesn't Fear Reciprocity. The provincial treasurer had described the possible loss of revenue on the R. and N. O. thru reciprocity, but with an enterprising development of the hinterland of Ontario, there would be no lack of freight for the government.

If the government would not seize the opportunity which New Ontario offered for creating a new rich farming section, with a home market at Toronto, the leader of the opposition should not know if the leader of the opposition was brave enough to do so. Studholme closed by announcing that he would oppose every item for immigration when in supply.

Hon. G. H. MacKay moved the adjournment of the debate. The motion was carried by the city council. W. D. Macpherson gave notice that he would introduce a bill giving the right of way of fire departments and highways while proceeding to a fire or answering a fire alarm call.

George H. Gooderham, South Toronto, has given notice to amend the Public Health Act. The bill is that proposed by the Barbers' Union, the features of which have been published.

HOW BIG TRUNK SEWER IS BEING ENGINEERED


'Tis a Veritable Romance of the Underground World—A Personally Conducted Tour.

A visitor to Toronto in the past few months who had occasion to pass along West Adelaide-street, doubtless wondered at many places along the street huge piles of bricks were heaped up and hoisting engines stationed at intervals busily engaged in pulling up buckets of clay and lowering bricks. To a Torontonian who knew the reason it would only be a matter of moments to explain that these were only visible signs of a great work being carried on by the city engineering department, in the construction of the high level interceptor of the trunk sewerage system. Had that visitor taken the trouble to follow the workings along the course of this great sewer, he would have found that the system of excavation changed from tunnelling to open trench work with steam shovels and had been so fortunate as to get the company of Engineer Wilfred Hollingsworth on the trip. The engineer has learned a number of interesting things about sewage disposal.


Course of Sewage. Thru the kindness of A. G. D. Blanchard, the engineer who has charge of this important work for the city, a World reporter was permitted to accompany Mr. Hollingsworth on his daily trip he makes over the works. They started in at the treatment tanks at the foot of Morley-street. RAILWAY BOARD'S ORDER NOT DEFINITE ENOUGH

Controller Church So Maintains and Runs Foul of City Solicitor.

City Solicitor Johnston and Controller Church had a lively tilt for a few minutes at the meeting of the board of control yesterday morning.

It all arose out of a request of Controller Church on street car matters, which he asked for at the inaugural meeting of this year's board of control.

"All these points were covered by the decision of the railway board," said the solicitor.

"I got no report on it," said the controller.

"It is on my table now. I can't do these things at once," retorted the solicitor.

"Do I understand that the city solicitor will not give us this report?" demanded the controller.

The report will come in due course," replied the city solicitor, in a tone that indicated there was no more to be said by the controller.

Controller Church declared after the meeting that the railway board had never covered the points he raised in his decision. What he wanted was to have the law amended as follows:

"To prevent P. A. Y. E. cars being operated without proper equipment with a license to be issued by every car with and placed in a conspicuous place in the car.

"To abolish the trailer after six months' notice.

"To allow the medical health officer to regulate the overcrowding, heating and ventilation of the cars.

"To compel the company to provide suitable waiting rooms and transfer points."

North Toronto Trip Deferred. Owing to the illness of the mayor and Controller Spence, the trip to North Toronto in connection with the proposed annexation, which was set for to-day, was indefinitely postponed. Controller Church declared that it was unsatisfactory to him to have Corporation Counsel Drayton conduct the work of enquiry. He contended that it was simply a question of one city department enquiring into the conduct of another if this were permitted, and argued that outside counsel should be called in. No action was taken.

In the absence of the mayor and Controller Spence, it was decided to defer action on the removal of the application of the Police Iron Works Company for the purchase of the old city yard, on the asphalene for dry dock purposes.

It was decided to oppose the bill introduced into the Ontario Legislature by Herbert Lennox, M.L.A., for the incorporation of the Toronto Interurban Railway Company. The city solicitor objected to the company being given an entrance into the city.
