# REDSOX WIN 3-2

**Giants, After Scoring One Run  
in Tenth, Make Errors, and  
a Little Hitting Does  
the Rest.**

BOSTON, Oct. 15.—(By Canadian Press) The Boston Red Sox, pennant winners of

The American League, are the world champions of 1912, defeating the New York Nationals today by a score of 3 to 1. In ten innings of a bitterly fought struggle, the Red Sox captured their fourth victory of the series and carried off their premier honors in baseball.

Nine innings of a pitching duel between Mathewson for the Giants and Eddiemann for the Sox, and a sensational home run by Sammy Joe Wood for the Red Sox, were the highlights of the championship game.

It was the end of a game which was baffling the batsmen of the Boston team. Engle led off for the Red Sox in the last half of the tenth. He went home for Joe Judge's ball. The Giants made their first run in the third, when Devore went to first on four balls and later scored on a two-base drive by Murray. Bedient employed a high inside curve ball which awoke a screaming out-put, and after Devore scored, there was no more scoring for New York until the tenth, when Murray cracked one of the two bases and the Giants took two more runs. Bedient then pitched a king's single to centre. These two runs were the last that the Giants were able to gather.

The Red Sox tied the score in the seventh, when Stahl knocked one of Mathewson's fade-aways into the air and it fell

between three fielders. Wagner walked to first base and the hope for a run seemed to be gone when Cady sent a fly to Fletcher for the second out.

It was here that Manager Stahl called on the pitcher to come in. He was sent to bat in place of Bedient.

Herzog, who had been in the game last night, came in to pitch. He was not as good as Herzog, and Stahl came over the plate for the tying run.

The fielding feature of the game was Herzog's throw to Doyle's terrific liner, which was labeled for a two-run, two-out crack of the bat Hooper turned and ran back towards the temporary fence. The pitcher came over his head, and Hooper slouched it to the outfield, outstretched in the very faces of the crowd.

Mathewson pitched 17 balls to the batsmen in the ten innings. He threw only 17 balls in the game, and in the smallest number of balls pitched in the history of the game.

mines by any twiler during the series. The tenth innings, which was still uncompleted when the game ended, was Mathewson's worst in delivery. He tossed 27 balls to the batters in that innings, ten of which were called balls. In the fifth innings Mathewson retired the Red Sox on four called balls, each resulting in an out to the outfield.

Mathewson passed five Boston men today, after having pitched twenty innings in the first four games of the series. He struck out four Boston batters, none after the fourth innings.

Bedient threw 99 balls to the New York team in the seven innings in which he pitched, while Wood tossed 34 balls in three innings.
