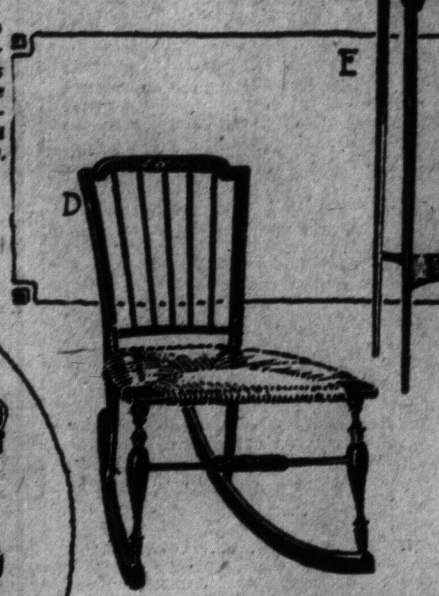

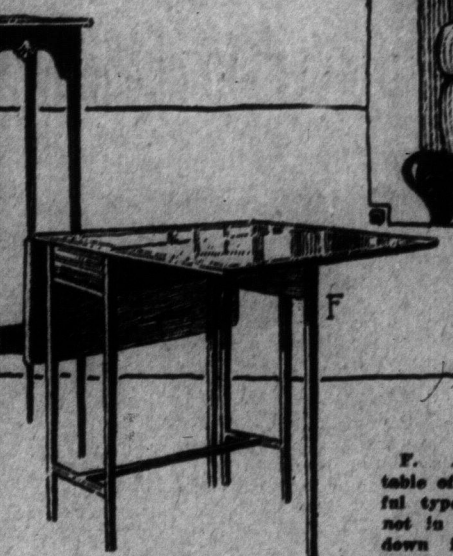
A. Any young woman about to

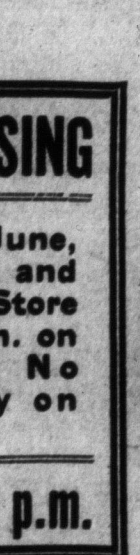
