The department of inland revenue is actifying milk dealers thruout the Montreal and Toronto districts in regard to the "act respecting weights and measures," better known as the "milk can bill." This measure is designed to remedy certain abuses in the milk and cream business. 'A "can" of milk is declared to be eight gallons; a half can, four gallans, and a quarter can, two gallons, and every can used in the milk trade is to be stamped with its capacity and the name of the maker there-

History of the Bill. The original bill was introduced by Mr. Campbell. It met with considerable opposition and was opposed in committee by the minister of agriculture. W. F. Maclean (South York) advocated to the form of the bouse and the bill on the floor of the house, and also before the committee. It was re-drafted by the officers of the inland revenue department, but the main fea-

ures are stated above. Under this act the department of inland revenue is authorized to make regulations and prescribe a tariff of fees for inspection. This has been done by the department, and circulars have been sent to each inspector. The tariff of charges is as follows:

When of a capacity of two gallons or under, a fee of 10 cents each.

When of a capacity exceeding two gallons and not available five gallons. lons and not exceeding five gallons, a fee of 20 cents each. When of a capacity exceeding five gallons and not exceeding ten gallons, fee of 30 cents each.
