TAOTAI SHENG IS CROOKED. Promises to Promote Safety of Circulation of Lying Pictures.

The Shanghai Press of Aug. 31, to hand last night, contains the following double and each of them bitterly denounced the Boxers. The edict which was received to-day bears date of Sept. 17, and reads as within his sphere of jurisdiction, but not-withstanding this explicit undertaking, we within his sphere of jurisdiction, but not withstanding this explicit undertaking, we find the lying pictures of Chinese Boxer victories over the allied troops in the north are still turned out in enormous numbers in the native city whence they are distributed for circulation thruout all the country villages around Shanghal, among the chinicse soldiers at the arsenal and at Woosang, and, surreptitiously, in all the tearshops and oplum-houses in the foreign settlements. That they are believed by the lower orders of the people is unquestionable. There is not a coolie in Shanghal to-day who is not quite convinced that the allies have been tnoroly thrashed up north by the Chinese, and on Tuesday night there was public and open rejoicing in the native city because, so the story ran, the foreigners in the settlements were so frightened about the way in which their countrymen had been cut to pieces by the Boxers, that they did not dare to disobey Taotal's edict foroiding them to liluminate their houses in honor of the few foreigners who had been left alive in Pekin. Up till a late hour on Tuesday evening gamps of cooles paraded the city streets buriesquing the foreign illuminations and torchight processions which did not come off, and all the thorofares were miled with applauding crowds of spectators, cheering on the ingenious masqueraders and jeering about the disappointed and frightened "Toreign aevils." Processions were formed in which men and boys marched along carrying lanters inscribed "Pekin," with representations of foreigners undergoing dreadful deaths at the hands of the Chinese shown on other lanterns of a nature which we can

The memorial of Li Hung Chang, Liu Kun Yi and Chang Chih Tung, three of the peace commissioners, denouncing Prince Tunn and other anti-foreign officials, and asking for the punishment of these persons and the Boxr leaders, reached the Throne on Sept. 15, and this edict seems to be the reply of the Emperor and Empress Dowager to the pro-foreign Viceroya. Worse still, the Thotal of Shanghal was to-day made Provincial Judge for Kwangsi. This is really a degradation for this official. He has taken positive action in the past in helping to keep the peace in the southern and central provinces, and has been friendly to foreigners. The Imperial clan dared not punish him here, but he will probably be beheaded when he reaches his new post. THE CAMBRIA'S NARROW ESCAPE T UMBER HARDWOOD FOR SALE Exhaust Pipes Left Open-Discover-Pumped Out. Early yesterday morning a night watch-

man at the waterfront discovered that water was rapidly filling the hold of the steamer Cambria, which is tied up at the foot of Scott-street. Captain Tim Sullivan was notified, but as there was no fire in the boat, the pumps could not be operated. It was 2 o'clock in the afternoon before assistance could be got; and in the meantime the water had reached the depth of a foot forward and about two inches stern. Help was secured from the steambarge Gordon Jerry, and after ten hours' work nearly all the water had been pumped out. Capt. Sullivan says the water entered the vessel thru the exhaust pipes, which had got below the surface of the water by the ballast rolling to her port side, thus partly overturning her. steamer Cambria, which is tied up at the




