NO MORE JOINT MEETINGS DEGREE OF CANDIDATES

Unless Stratton and Hale Appear
Meetings Will Be One-Sided.

Cobden, Dec. 16.—(Special)—"No joint meetings without Stratton or Hale," has been pinned on the standard of Candidate Dunlop. In the interest of himself and Gamney, Candidate Hale, speaking to the World today, declared that joint meetings were useless, and he was unalterably opposed to them.

On Tuesday night Mr. Dunlop was favorably inclined to allow opposition to Gamney, at his Beachburg meeting, but tonight the standard of Stratton or Hale, or Stratton wished to meet Mr. Dunlop or Gamney, all well and good, but no one else would be permitted to oppose Gamney.

The principle advanced by the Conservatives is that Gamney is not on trial, but rather that Stratton is the culprit, and should appear to refute any charges made against him. The suggestion of the Liberals to-night that Dr. Mackay of Pembroke be again allowed to speak against Gamney, precipitated the announcement by the Conservatives.

Mr. Stratton is in the riding, has been invited publicly and privately to face his accusers, and in the interest of fair discussion and dissemination of knowledge, should be prepared to defend himself.

George P. Graham, M.L.A., when seen by The World regarding this proposition, said: "Why Stratton is 40 miles away."

If you were Provincial Secretary, would you decline to face Gamney and discuss his story? He was asked by Mr. Graham though slowly, but declined to express an opinion one way or the other. He conveyed the impression in his manner and expression that Gamney would not go unopposed, if he were Stratton.

A prominent Liberal worker, who has been in the riding for the past two years, and who has not been particularly successful, expressed his views that the only fair thing for Stratton to do was to take the stump, and to let the people face him whenever he showed his head. "The people of this riding," he said, "do not know Stratton, and they do not know the people of Toronto. Let them be discussed by the two principals. That would be the fairest thing to do. If I were Stratton and did not earn my word uttered by Gamney down his throat."

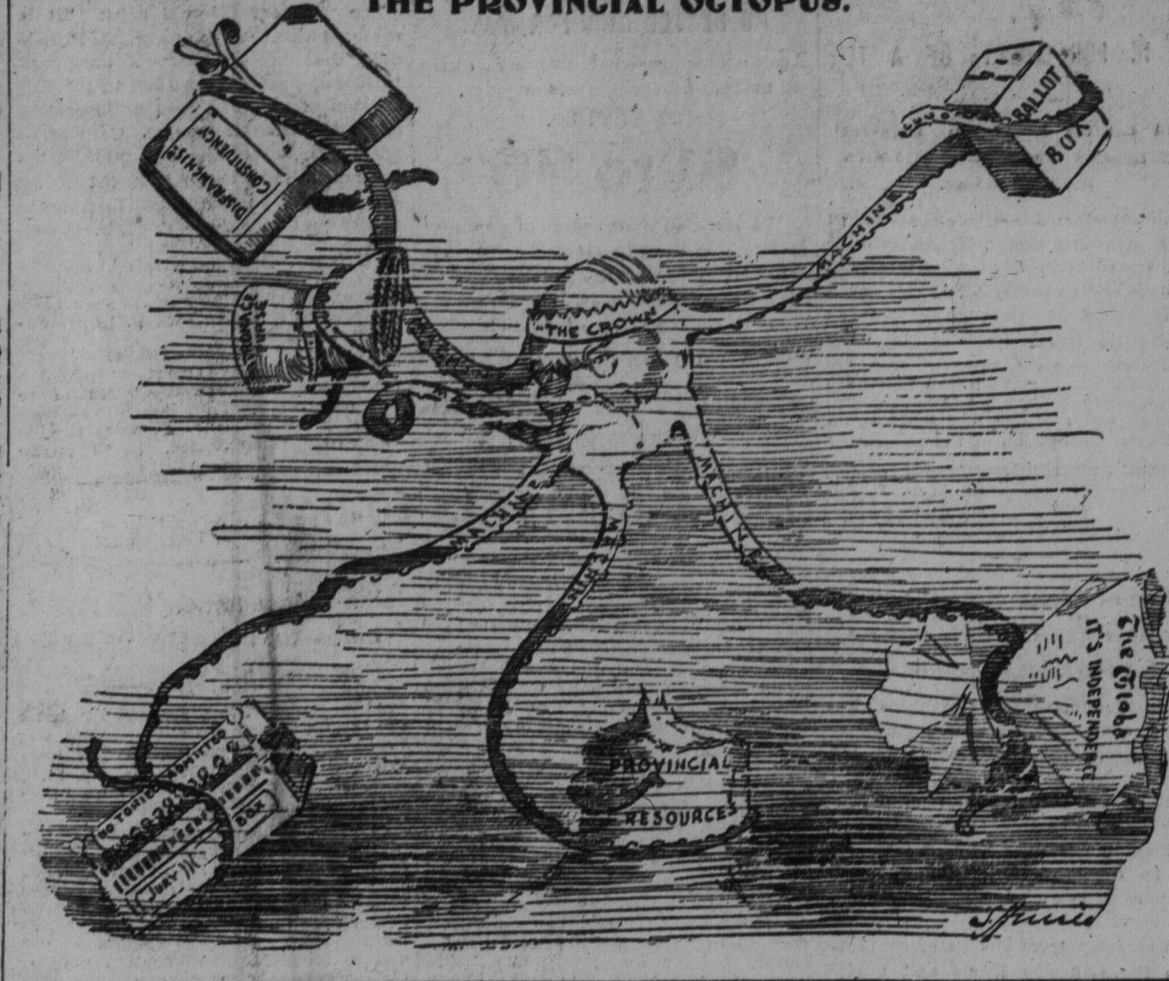
