THE G. T. R. BILL

Arrangements for its Passage by the Senate.

[Special to The Advertiser per C. P. R.]
Ottawa, July 13.—It is understood that an arrangement has been reached between opposition and government sides in the senate to let the G. T. R. agreement bill pass. In committee the bill will be amended by striking out the 40th clause, regarding the traffic arrangement, so that the G. T. R. will not be bound by a 99-year agreement, any more than the inter-colonial.

KILLED BY LIGHTNING IN CHURCH.

Allentown, Pa., July 13.—While waiting for service to begin in the Mennonite Church at Weiss Port, last night, Miss Florence Oswald, aged 15 years, was struck by lightning and instantly killed. Her two girl companions, the only other occupants of the building, were stunned, but not seriously injured.

FOUL PLAY SUSPECTED.

Brantford, July 13.—The express man, when driving to Brantford on the Paris road, Tuesday night, found a man in a critical condition lying on the roadway. He put him in his wagon and brought him to Brantford, but he had expired before reaching here. The body was that of O'Reilly, a cigar-maker. It is said O'Reilly and another young man were out driving Tuesday evening, and reports of foul play are in circulation. The young man is now in the cells and an investigation will be held.

The leading New England granite quarries are about to combine in a \$12,000,000 trust. None of the stock will be offered to the public.

The Situation to Date.

This forenoon the combined City Council and Citizens' Committee met in secret session. They had previously received a letter from the Company, conceding a partial arbitration.

Today the men's committee sent in a reply, that they were perfectly willing to enter into a full arbitration, but not a partial one.

The City Council and Citizens' Committee today held consultations, first with the representatives of the Company, and second with representatives of the strikers. What the Citizens' Committee are trying to do, is to find a basis upon which to arbitrate.

Let them make the basis for arbitration full and complete. The fuller and completer the better in the long run for all concerned.

The Globe's View.

The Toronto Globe exonerates its regular London correspondent from the charge of having sent the dispatch which stated that labor had organized the limited disturbance of Saturday.

It has since become known who wrote the dispatch. The Globe quite properly takes the ground that the interests of workmen cannot be promoted by violence, and then proceeds to remark:

"It is to be deplored that so many conflicts are precipitated through the refusal of employers to recognize the unions, which are simply the agencies of the workmen. It is time the unions were recognized as an essential of our present industrial system, and the consensus of independent opinion among economists of note is that their influence is beneficial to employers as well as to employees. It does not compromise an employer's dignity to treat with a representative who is generally the best informed, the most reasonable and the most valuable employee of his class. The privilege of dismissing each employee in turn who ventures to protest may seem valuable, but even without a union it can be exercised only within limits. The influences which cause a surplus of men, even in the best of times, which make it an easy matter to fill the place of every recalcitrant or dissatisfied worker, make the union a necessity of our industrial system, and where it is the strongest and the best disciplined there is the best industrial condition and the minimum of friction."

The Council's Duty Now Clear.

Elsewhere will be found the letter of the street railway employee, declining the Company's offer of a partial or restricted adjudication of the present difference. The employees ask a full, unconditional arbitration, the decision to be binding on both parties. We do not see how anyone can cavil at this position.

The civic committee have gone as far as they can go in trying to bring the parties together on common ground. The duty of the City Council is now clear. That body should be convened at once, and should pass a resolution demanding that the whole case be submitted to a full and unconditional arbitration. Neither party would dare refuse. The City Council have a locus standi in this matter, because the Company hold a public franchise. It is incumbent on the aldermen to exercise their authority without delay, and put an end to this intolerable situation. If they do not, the public will sternly hold them to the consequences.

WANT FULL ARBITRATION

The Strikers' Committee Refuses the Company's Offer

The Civic Committee Again Meet to Consider the Situation.

Will Not Accept Restricted or Conditional Arbitration—Text of the Reply.

The special strike committee met at the city hall this morning, with Ald. Parnell in the chair.

The committee of the striking street railway employees have presented their reply to the company's offer of partial arbitration. The communication is addressed to Ald. Parnell, chairman of the civic committee, and reads as follows:

"Sir,—The undersigned, on behalf of the members of Division 97, of the Amalgamated Association of Street Railway Employees of America, of London, Ont., beg leave to inform the committee from whom they received a copy of the communication dated the 11th day of July, 1899, offering an arbitration on behalf of the London Street Railway Company under certain conditions and restrictions, that they cannot accept the arbitration under the restrictions named. The men insist that the arbitration shall be full and free, covering all matters in dispute which have caused friction and resulted in their being forced to strike, in order that the settlement to be arrived at by the arbitrators shall be a final one, and put an end to all the existing differences, as already offered by them. (Signed)

"THE COMMITTEE."

The chairman reported that Ald. Rumball, Graham, Carrothers and himself had met last night at the mayor's office by good luck rather than good management, and had discussed the situation. Their conclusion was that the only thing left to be done was to lay down a basis for arbitration that would be fair and equitable to both parties, and there let the labors of the committee close. They had met and met in their efforts to bring the parties together for their own good and effected nothing in the way of a settlement. To continue would evidently be a fruitless task. The only reasonable and decent way would be, they thought, to draw up a fair means of arbitration, and let the responsibility rest upon the side which refused to accept it, if it were refused by either.

At this juncture the reporters were asked to retire, and the discussion continued behind closed doors.

It was subsequently decided to call in the company and the strikers, with a view to arriving at a basis of arbitration.
