## 4,000 FALL IN CENTRAL AMERICAN BATTLE; SALVADOR CRUSHES THE GUATEMALANS

Sweeping Victory for Former Causes Guatemalan Government to Sue for Peace---General Regalado Assassinated by Members of His Escort.

Mexico City, July 17.-News was reselved yesterday that a rumor was current in Salvador that Gen. Regalado was assassinated by two men, who formed part of his escort, and that these men were Guatemalans employed for the purpose. Col. Pinedos' forces, which entered Guatemala via British Honduras, are now said to be in the mountains south of the Mexican State

The following dispatch was received from San Salvador: "Never before in the history of Central America has there been such hard fighting. Salvador, Guatemala had about three men to one. Notwithstanding the great odds. Salvador won every battle. The loss on both sides was great, Salvador losing about 700 killed, and 1,100 wounded, and Guatemala about 2,800 killed and 3,900 wounded. Gen. Regalado when killed was over a mile in advance. He had 50 picked officers and men with him Everyone was killed, and after the rear troops came up and drove the Guatemalan troops forward, they found over 600 dead Guatemalan soldiers, including severa! officers. In that battle, Salvador captured the enemy's artillery. Then Guatemala asked for peace. Salchanged conditions."



## WINDSOR HANGS HIMSELF IN JAIL

### Christopher Spindleman, Charged With Brutal Killing of His Wife, Strangles Himself With Shoelaces.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Windsor, Ont., July 17.-Eluding the vigilance of a special watch placed on him, Christopher Spindleman, who on Saturday killed his wife, hanged himself at Sandwich jail early this morning. His body was found a few minutes before 6 o'clock by Turnkey Her, who was on his morning rounds. The murderer had successfully wound a pair of shoe laces around his neck, tied one end to a chain which is attached to his cot, and slowly strangled himself. With Spartan fortitude he waited for death at his own hands. He had carefully laid his plans for taking his life. There is no doubt he intended selfdestruction after he was first arrested, having been thwarted by his son in his attempt to shoot himself.

Chief Wills ordered a special watch on the prisoner. Sergt. Jackson and Officer Lister purposely removed his shoes and took them away from him. They searched carefully for an instrument to commit suicide and made his detention so secure that he had no means of "snuffing out."

Sergt. Jackson said: "Spindleman would have done the deed here if we had given him the chance. We left him with only his underclothing, and he would have a hard time in ending his life by hanging or strangulation."

The murderer took advantage of the first opportunity to carry out his original plans. After being committed to Sandwich the prisoner was under a special watch. Jailer Sparks detailed two men to keep an eye on the cell and have an electric light burning in the corridor all night. Drawing the noose taut, he turned over on his face, and death must have resulted in a few minutes from strangulation.

#### account of recent heavy rains. spent seven years in exile at Sydney, MOB CHASES WOMAN ORATORS; BREAKS UP SUFFRAGIST AFFAIR

London, July 17. - Retribution has befallen the suffragettes, or, as one newspaper calls them, the fooligans, in Manchester, where their own meeting was more completely wrecked than any they have tried to break up. A huge, good-natured crowd listened to the speakers for some time, but when dissentients began to roast the orators with inconvenient comments, their spirit became infectious. The voices of the speakers were drowned in derisive shouts and laughter.

Then James Kier Hardie, a Labor member of Parliament, appeared, and the animosity he lately courted by championing the Zulus against the South African colonists, broke loose. The crowd soon became rowdy and many of the audience started for the platform.

The meeting was being held in a deep hollow in a public park, and as the crowd surged downward the position became dangerous, threatening a murderous crush at the bottom of the hollow. Women shrieked and fainted. Men on the lower slopes began to fight those rushing down, to prevent a catastro-

phe. General pandemonium followed. Realizing the danger, Mr. Hardie and his supporters organized a movement uphill, conducting the women speakers. It was a stiff fight. They were often carried off their feet by the crowd, but they saved themselves from disaster, and reached the top of the hill, where they were mobbed, being compelled to run for safety.

They were vainly pursued by their enemies. The other women speakers were less fortunate. They were hustled, hooted at and chivied. Eventually they took refuge in a house, which was besieged by a howling mob until the police rescued them.

Mrs. Mitchell, one of the suffragettes, made a good fight. In a scrimmage she knocked down one male assailant and smashed her umbrella over the head of another.
