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LABOR MAN JUMPS ON FELLOW-WORKERS AT BORDEN MEETING

Haven't Sense Enough to Stick Together, Says O'Donoghue.

BECK BADLY HECKLED
Made Several Slips at Cronyn Gathering Last Evening.

"The old Government made many mistakes, and if Sir Robert Borden and his Government had gone to the country today, I'd have been against them tooth and nail," said J. G. O'Donoghue at the meeting held in the interest of Major Hume Cronyn at the Masonic Hall Thursday night. He was also addressed by Sgt. Matt Wayman, a Major Cronyn's aide, and John Wilson of Toronto was chairman.

O'Donoghue also claimed that the workmen would not stick together. "Unfortunately, although they know from their own organizations that there is strength in union, they haven't sense enough to stick together," he said.

The president of the Trades and Labor Congress, J. M. Watters, had in his speech declared himself against conscription, the speaker claimed, but in doing so he was not following the expression of his own congress, he charged.

He then quoted from the report of the last congress to the effect that they should not do anything to hinder the Government from obtaining reinforcements for the men at the front, and he implied that Mr. Watters had done so.

One of the principles of the labor movement, he added, for the compulsion a man would be forced to join a union before he began to work in a shop. Trades unions made use of the boycott in this way, and compulsion was not new to them, he claimed.

"I venture to say," he repeated, "that the labor people will not have sense enough to follow up their advantage by electing their own representatives; it is regrettable, but true." The new Union Government doesn't come across with conscription of wealth and the utilization of national resources, then I'll be the first one to help kick them out," he added.

Regarding the charge that the interests were behind the present Government, he said that they were behind the last Government.

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hing any Government, so that they might as well forget the interests, and make their choice without reference to that.

Got After Beck.
Considerable amusement was provided for the crowd at the expense of Sir Adam Beck when, during the course of his address, assuming an ignorance on the part of the audience, that was to say the least not flattering, he made bold to ask the question: "Who indorses Bourassa and Lavergne?"

"Borden," replied some well-informed man in the gallery.
Sir Adam was plainly taken back, and while he did not deny the man's statement, he implied that it was not correct, countering with: "You are a young man and should have more regard for the truth. We old fellows do slip up a word occasionally."

After bellowing a while he recovered himself, adding: "Lemieux, Lavergne, Bourassa, Euler of Kitchener and Gibbons are all Laurier candidates, who have accepted the indorsement of Sir Wilfrid Laurier."

Laurier was opposed to Bourassa and Lavergne in his excitement.
"Borden," he said that in the local and patriotic city of London you voted for a man who will follow Bourassa and the rest of Sir Wilfrid is returned," he charged.

At Wits' End.
Sir Adam was obviously at his wits' end. For a moment he was at a loss for an answer, but apparently grasping at the first thought that entered his head, he managed to jerk out: "He'll be done with you and your followers before long."

He then endeavored to pass the unanswered question off as a joke, saying: "You wouldn't be so jocular if you had seen what I had seen in France."

Continuing, he said that he hoped to hear less of politics when the war was over, adding that "politics have been a curse in this war."

Sgt. Wayman, who has returned to this country after having been wounded at Vimy Ridge, received an ovation when he arose.

He always been a Socialist before the war, he said, and he told of the large representation of the labor organizations that was to be found in the Canadian forces overseas, and also among the 35,000 Canadians who were lying beneath the soil of France and Flanders.

Many Insults.
In describing number of insults suffered by returned soldiers in Quebec, he neglected, possibly owing to

fact that having been away doing his bit in France he had forgotten the details of conditions in Canada, to state that whatever aversion to British soldiers in Quebec was inspired there during the past six years by the cabalistic ministrations of Premier Borden, Messrs. Lavergne and Blomdin and their followers.

The United States was to be parcelled out after the war, according to the arrangements, he stated, the Western States going to Japan, the southern portion to Mexico, and the eastern coast to be held in subjection by a German army.

Hans and Fritz in the Canadian army papers were put there to get Canadian children to regard the Germans as harmless and funny. "There was nothing very comical in Hans and Fritz as we knew them in the line," he added.

No Light Matter.
"You can't afford to take the matter of this election lightly," he declared. "You've got to forget party differences and religious differences. Don't play the Kaiser's game by being disunited. Get together. If there is a cleavage, the Kaiser will get through it."

Major Cronyn stated that he was a strong believer in trade unionism, and thought that it was the duty of labor organizations to select the proper men to represent them in the House of Commons. He was placed in Parliament.

Australia, though it had about two million less people than we had, had sent nearly as many men overseas, he stated. About thirteen months ago a referendum had been taken there, and it had been defeated by a majority of about 7,000 out of a total of 2,200,000 votes. Another referendum had been proposed there, it was stated, and the speakers asked the audience if they wanted to follow the example of Australia.

Attacks had been made on the government that had passed out of existence, and efforts had been made to set class against class, and criticisms had been leveled at unavoidable conditions arising out of the war, but these methods he deprecated.

Answer-3. No. Let him communicate with W. E. Wismer, deputy registrar, Royal Bank Building, London, Ontario, who can issue a permit to him.


