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ONTARIO'S CROPS IN FAIRLY GOOD ORDER, GOVERNMENT REPORT

Haying Not Over Yet in Some Parts.

TIMOTHY LACKS LENGTH

Rain during the last week interfered somewhat with haying, but on the whole the crop is being harvested under favorable circumstances. Many farmers in the Lake Erie district are already through with cutting, but considerable yet remains to be done elsewhere. The average yield is likely to be only a moderate one.

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WORKERS BELIEVE ASSESSMENTS ON HOMES TOO HIGH

Comparison To Be Made With the Real Value Shortly.

Contenting that the assessment of the workingmen's homes of London is proportionately higher than it ought to be, the trades and labor council at its regular meeting last night resolved to distribute printed forms to the local unions for the individual members to make returns of the real and assessed value of their property. No. 1 committee will deal with the question when the returns are complete.

Sunday cars to Springbank are another question that is demanding a deal of attention from the labor men. Nearly all the petitions which have been circulated for signatures have been returned filed. Those that are yet out will be collected in time to be presented to the city council at its next meeting.

No. 1 committee reported that it had communicated with the public utilities commission with regard to the municipal coal yard and the city's inability to secure any coal as yet.

The special committee reported progress in regard to the investigation of the fire department.

On the recommendation of the board of trustees the council will continue to meet in the present quarters in the Dufferin block. Several other sites have been inspected, but they were found unsuitable.

The appointment of delegates to the 24th annual Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, which is being held in Quebec in September, was deferred until the next regular meeting of the council.

A resolution which closed the meetings of the trades and labor council to the representatives of a local paper on account of its breach of trust in publishing items that the press was asked to keep out of print, was passed by the council.

General trade is good in London, according to the reports of the delegates of the local unions.

Vin. P. Covert, fifth international vice-president of the Moving Picture Operators' Union of Toronto, was present and addressed the meeting. He is in London in the interests of the picture operators' and stage workers' unions. New wage scales and working conditions have been negotiated with several theatre managers in the city, and it is expected that the scale will be accepted by all local houses. London trades unions were complimented for their efficient co-operation in bettering the conditions of the local workers.

The greetings of the Toronto unions were presented by the local men. President Dean, on behalf of the trades and labor council, thanked Mr. Covert for his brotherly greetings, and expressed the wish that his visits to London might be more frequent.

DELAWARE RED CROSS WORK REORGANIZED

DELAWARE, July 17. — A well-attended meeting was held in the town hall, presided over by Rev. W. H. Hartley, for the purpose of reorganizing Red Cross work in the township. It was unanimously decided that the Delaware Patriotic League act as the executive committee of the municipality, receive and invest funds, purchase materials for all workers in the township, etc. Mrs. (Dr.) J. G. Blew was elected a member of the executive committee of the county organization for Red Cross work. The president of the league is Mrs. W. H. Hartley, with Miss Oulton as secretary and treasurer. The league meets on Thursday afternoons at the town hall, when work that is completed can be brought in and replaced. Help is greatly needed for sewing and knitting.

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
