# NFLUENZA MAY **DELAY VICTORY** LOAN CAMPAIGN

**Epidemic Causing Uncertainty** of Future Plans.

FINANCIERS' IDEAS DIFFER

Sir Thomas White To Make; Decision in the Next Few Days.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Montreal, Oct. 18 .- Plans in connection with the opening of the Victory Loan campaign on October 28 remain very much in the air because of the "flu" epidemic. The most disturbing feature of the outlook is that the epi-

feature of the outlook is that the epidemic is only now beginning to take hold in the West. Even if it cleared up in the east in the next ten days, it might be at the worst in the West at that very time. Opinions as to the best course to take are now being gathered from loan managers all over the country, and no doubt these will be submitted to Sir Thomas White for a final decision on his return to Ottawa in the course of the next few days.

Opinions of Financiers.

Opinion in the financial district appears to be divided as to the necessity or advisability of a postponement of the campaign. In favor of continuing as originally planned, it is argued that good headway could be made through newspaper publicity and canvassing by mail, even if the epidemic continued severe. Most people who will buy the bonds have made up their minds as to how much they will buy and will not be influenced one way or the other by the presence or absence of campaign propaganda.

For the benefit of those who need

For the benefit of those who need urging the campaign might be extended a week or more, if the epidemic had passed of, by then, so that the full weight of campaign methods might be brought to bear on the laggards.

Against that is the fear that the loan's prospects would be injured unless the country could be worked up to a state of enthusiasm right from the start, as well as the fear that sickness might badly disorganize the working forces for the loan.

DR. HASTING'S OPINION.

Influenza Becoming Milder In Type Now.

Although statistics are not available at the Institute of Public Health as to the total number of deaths from influenza since the epidemic started, there have been at least six deaths in London during the last 24 hours. 


