the total today.

total for the day amounted to \$438,950.

flags, both having added over \$50,000
to their original objective.

MILITARY SERVICEAddress Your Problems to the Mil-
itary Editor of The Advertiser and

ficial Information.SUBSCRIBER, Q.—I am still
necessary for married men to carry
their marriage certificates on their
person.
2. Now that the war is over is it
still necessary for farmers exempt-
ed from military service to carry their
military papers?
A.—1. Yes, it is the intention of the
authorities to apprehend all deserters
and defaulters, and this will be facili-
tated by all men eligible for military
service carrying their papers, and thus
the authorities will be able to locate
them in the near future.A.—2. Yes, No information has been re-
ceived here suspending the military
service act, and therefore all exempted
men should carry their papers on their
person and thus avoid trouble.WOODSTOCK, Q.—My husband
was recommended for the military
medal and distinguished conduct
medal in the spring of 1916, and
received the decorations. He was
killed in the war. Would it be wise for me to write the
war office, London, England, re-
garding the medals he is returning to
Canada in the near future?A.—It is quite possible that he may
have been recommended for the medals,
but the medals have not yet been
awarded either of the above decora-
tions. It would be useless for you to
write the war office for the medals,
as you would not receive them. The
award was gazetted it would facilitate
matters if you wrote to the war office,
London, and ask them to send you the
decoration of your husband to apply
through his commanding officer over-
seas to the authorities. He has not
received the decorations, provided
that he has been gazetted as entitled
to them.MITCHELL, Q.—What will
be done with deserters apprehend-

citizenship and the right to sue in
the civil courts?
A.—1. Unless your husband is at present
under consideration by the authorities,
but no procedure has as yet
been announced.

period of seven days or longer?

cided on their individual merits.

His counsel said that the man makes \$100 per month, and is well provided for with a handsome bank account, so that he would not be in need of the price of the ring.
