GERMANS ARE AIDING REDS

Ignace Paderewski Says That Germans Are Helping Bolsheviki in Every Way to Embarras Poland-Germany Hoping to Win in East What She Lost in West.

Paris, Sept. 5.—"Germany, defeated on the west, has turned to the east, where she is waging a battle with the hope of achieving the victory she could not win on the other fronts." said Ignace Jan Paderewski, Polish premier, today to the Associated Press, while discussing Polish conditions. M. Paderewski will appear before the supreme council of the peace conference to discouncil of the peace conference to dis council of the peace conference to cuss the critical situation in Tes and Silesia. critical situation in Tescher and Silesia.

"In Upper Silesia. East Prussia, Lithuania, along the Bolshevik front in the vicinity of Minsk and along the Ukrainian front, Polish armies are forced to face armed enemies," he continued. "Where these enemies are not Germans, they are aided by Germans, who are urging the Bolsheviki forward in every way to embarrass Poland. Our new Government, with limited supplies and little clothing for its army, finds the situation desperate.

Germans are fomenting disorder and lending assistance to the Bolsheviki. On all sides we are forced to face this new war that Germany is waging against the Alled cause. She is determined to conquer Rusia at any cost and is making every effort to hamper us in our battle against disorder. German propagandists are twisting every clash between our troops and the Bolsheviki into Jewish pogroms. "We must rely on our friends to refute slanders and keep faith in us. Our people have resisted the blandishments of Bolshevism so far, but there is a limit to human endurance. We hope for a speedy ratification of the treaty, and pray for the steadying influence of Allied troops in harassed districts where plebiscites are to be held to determine the future status of those regions."

PEACE TERMS RECEIVED BY AUSTRIANS WITH GREATEST SURPRISE AND INDIGNATION

Ministry Under Karl Renner Is Expected to Collapse as a Consequence-Monarch ists Consider All Hopes of a Return of the Hapsburgs Has Been Definitely Killed.

Geneva, Sept. 5.—The Austrian peace terms have been received in Vienna with the greatest surprise and indignation, ac-Ottawa cording to advices reaching here. It is believed that the Renner ministry will fall as a consequence. Monarchist circles consider that the terms have definitely killed any hope of the return of the Hapsburgs. Former Emperor Charles, who received the news from Paris soon after the reply of the Allies was handed to the Austrian commission, has decided to leave Switzerland.

U.S. EXCHANGE RATE IS DRIVING CANADIAN TRADE ELSEWHERE

New York, Sept. 5.—The New York Commercial says that the high rate of exchange prevailing between the United States and Canada in favor of the former is having the effect to be expected from such a situation, in diverting trade into other channels. uation, in diverting trade into other channels.

DOMINION-WIDE STRIKE IS NOW THREATENED UNLESS MEN HELD AT WINNIPEG ARE LIBERATED

Secretary of Mineworkers Declare Gigantic Walkout Will Tie Up Every Industry From Coast to Coast Unless Bail Is Granted to Labor Leaders by September 17.

Sydney, N.S., Sept. 5.—Unless the Winnipeg strike leaders now imprisoned in the West are released on bail before the 17th of this month, Canada will be tied up from coast to coast by a gigantic strike, embrac ing every industry under union control, according to a statement made to the Canadian Press by J. B. MacLachlan, United Mine Workers' district secretary. Mr. MacLachlan represented the situation as serious in the extreme, unless the authorities grant the Winnipeg men bail. The threatened strike will tie up the coal mines of this district and practically close down industry in Sydney. A gigantic mass meeting of district 26 is being arranged for Sunday next at Glace Bay, to be addressed by R. F. Blackstone of San Francisco and Mr. MacLachlan. It is probable that on the same day a meeting will be held in Sydney to discuss the Winnipeg situation. The proposed strike is the most gigantic menace of the kind which ever threatened industry in Canada. If the plans of union officials, as stated by Mr. MacLachlan, are carried out, and the western authorities prove inflexible, there will hardly be a wheel turning across the whole breadth of the country from Vancouver east after the 17th

BECK'S STATEMENT IS **DECLARED INCORRECT** BY GUELPH MAYOR

J. E. Carter Characterizes the Talk About Holding Up the Line As "All Rubbish."

ANOTHER VOTE COMING

Says Hydro Minister Has No Intention of Building Road.

Toronto, Sept. 5 .- "That is absolutely ncorrect," declared Mayor J. E. Carter of Guelph, Ont., over the long-distance telephone today when asked about the statement made by Sir Adam Beck at the meeting of the Ontario Hydro-Radial Association yesterday that Guelph was holding up the Toronto to London radial by its delay in signing the agreement to provide the additional amount necessitated by defeat of the bylaw in four other municipalities. The mayor said he had no authority to sign away \$74,000 of the people's money, in addition to the \$734,000 already voted for the project.

"That's all rubbish about Guelph holding up the line," said Mr. Carter. "Sir Adam Beck has no intention of building the road. He said so on the public platform—that we wanted the Grand Trunk Railway, and did not want to parallel the lines. He made the statement here that the Grand Trunk was going to be taken over. All he wants it signed for is to bluff the Government, and we don't believe in that kind of stuff."

Mr. J. M. Taylor, president of the Guelph Chamber of Commerce, agreed with the mayor that he could not sign away the people's money without a sanctioning vote. "We are asked for ten per cent more," he said. "and the people will vote on it."

The mayor added that the people would vote next January regarding the additional money required. The mayor said he had no authority

12,400 Tons of Raw Sugar For Canada During September TO FIGHT THE BRITISH SEES GREATER MENACE

Supply From Cuba Will Be Troops in Uster Are There Tai Chi Quo Declares His Peo-Brought by Government Merchant Marine.

Montreal, Sept. 5.—During the present month the Canadian Government merchant marine will bring to Montreal 12,40 dtons of raw sugar. During September four Canadian Government freighters will arrive at Montreal from Cuba with full cargoes of raw sugar, which will be delivered to the Montreal refineries, and speedily converted into material for domestic and other consumption. This will make a total of 32,000 tons of raw sugar to be brought to Canada during the season.

Practically all the raw sugar to be brought here during September will come from Cuba.
