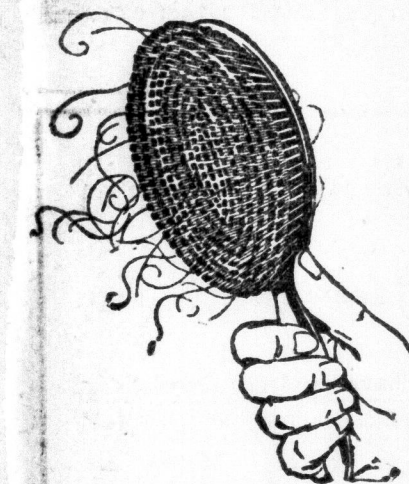

TAKE STEPS TO PLACE CANADIAN AT WASHINGTON

Discussions in Progress Between United States and Great Britain.

DIFFICULTY OF STATUS

England Interested Because of One of Her Dominions.

NEW YORK, April 26.—A dispatch to the Evening Sun from Washington, D.C., today says:

Discussions are in progress between the United States and Great Britain, which give substantial promise of ending in an agreement to have Canada represented in Washington by a diplomatic agent of high rank. Such representation is understood to be desired by both, Canada and the United States and to be unopposed by Great Britain. The conversations on the subject are described by the wish of all concerned to facilitate negotiations between Canada and the United States on questions in which Great Britain is interested only by the fact that Canada is one of her dominions. So far as can be learned the only difficulty that has been encountered to date is the exact status and rank that the diplomat would have and in determining in advance so as to avoid any chance of friction, relation that he would bear to the British ambassador in Washington. The prospects are that the Canadian representative would have wide freedom of action in matters directly affecting the Dominion. A decision on this point may be expected soon.

MAKES DEFINITE OVERTURES. WASHINGTON, D. C., April 26.—With the approval of the British Government, Canada has made definite overtures to the United States for the establishment of direct diplomatic relations between the two adjoining countries.

Announcement to this effect was made at the state department tonight following a conference today between Secretary of State Coby and representatives of various American print paper manufacturers and publishers concerning the increasingly difficult position in which these interests are finding themselves as a result of the Canadian embargo on the export of pulpwood. At this conference the suggestion was made to Mr. Coby that unless Canada should consent through friendly negotiations to modify this embargo the United States must resort to retaliatory measures. In his reply Mr. Coby disclosed the fact that the United States might soon be able to conduct direct diplomatic negotiations with Canada.

It is understood here that Sir Auckland Geddes, the new British ambassador, will soon go to Ottawa and there arrange details of the new relationship including the selection of the Canadian representative to be sent to Washington.

ONTARIO LEGISLATURE OFFERS TRIBUTE TO HON. A. G. MACKAY

To Send Resolution To Alberta Legislature.

[Special to The Advertiser.] TORONTO, April 26.—From all sections of the Ontario Legislature today regret was expressed at the passing in Alberta of the late Hon. A. G. Mackay, at one time commissioner of crown lands for Ontario, and later leader of the Liberal Opposition here. Upon motion of H. H. Dewar, seconded by Premier Drury, the House decided to appoint a committee to draft a resolution expressing to the Alberta Legislature Ontario's recognition of the services of the late Hon. Mr. Mackay and sympathy with the western province in its irreparable loss.

Mr. Dewar said it was not only because of the fact that the late Hon. Mr. Mackay formerly occupied the position of leader of the Liberal party that he desired to move the resolution, but also because of his past intimate acquaintance with the late minister. Hon. Mr. Mackay, he said, was a classmate of his in university, and his brilliant advance to eminence as one of the foremost counsel of the nation had been watched with sympathetic interest by Mr. Dewar.

Emergency Service. Hon. Mr. Mackay, said Mr. Dewar, "gave to this province for many years honest, faithful and energetic services, and was one of those who had helped to put into the Western provinces principles he learned in the older provinces."

Premier Drury, in seconding Mr. Dewar's motion, expressed entire concurrence in the sentiments expressed by the leader of the Opposition. "I join with him," he said, "my tribute to the memory of the late Hon. Mr. Mackay, and in my support of the resolution before the House."

Loyal to Country. Hon. Thomas Crawford, who occupied the position of speaker in the time of Hon. Mr. Mackay in the House, referred to the late Alberta minister as a man "loyal to his party and to his country, a man of great ability and of great speech, a man who was a hard hitter, a good fighter, but always fair, and never known to strike a blow below the belt."

The House unanimously decided to adopt the resolution.

ELEVEN-YEAR-OLD BOY DROWNED IN RIVER AT HANOVER

Struggles of Dog Cause of the Fatal Accident.

HANOVER, April 26.—A sad drowning accident occurred about 1½ miles south of here about 3 p.m. yesterday, when Henry Rosel, aged 11 years, lost his life while attempting to cross a log which spanned the river. He was carrying a dog which jumped out of the boat when half way across the log, causing him to lose his balance and fall into the rapidly rushing stream. The only witnesses of the tragedy were his youngest brother and two other small boys. Henry Rosel was the eldest son of Mike Rosel. He is survived by his father and five brothers and sisters. The body was found in three feet of water about half a mile from where the boy fell in at noon today. The home funeral for the Hanover boy was held at the Hanover funeral home and the body was carried by a majority of 339.

OPENS NAVIGATION AT PORT WILLIAM

PORT WILLIAM, April 26.—The steamer Collingwood opened navigation yesterday morning at 9:15, entering the river to load at the Mutual Elevator. About five hours earlier the Westmount opened navigation at Port Arthur harbor.

COMMITTEE TO GO TO WORK ON ELECTION BILL

Farmer-Labor Members Hostile When Called "Union Government."

TORONTO, April 26.—Ontario's new election act was today referred to a committee to consist of six Farmer-Labor members, two Liberal and three Conservative. Premier Drury wanted to make the "most perfect" election act which could be framed. The clause setting a fixed date for elections is "held over" until next session. The premier objected to the word "with-drawn" in connection with the clause and put up a stiff defence for it. He was rather warm in his reply to charges that the clause was inserted to "save the Government's face."

"It is not an attempt to bolster up the life of the present Government for four years," he declared, "this Government has not the confidence of the Legislature or of the people it wants to go to Uris, I have no intention to put life into a Government corpse by artificial respiration, nor do we intend to do any jiggering, dying life."

Avoids Uncertainty. He saw great good in the clause because it did away with all uncertainty regarding elections, thereby not disturbing business, and it kept one party from planning against another for its own ends. However, the clause would be held over in the meantime. Many Liberals wanted it kept in. Sam Clarke (West Northumberland) thought the act a good one. He started something when he called the Farmer-Labor coalition "union government."

"No," retorted practically every member of the Government side, "call us anything you like, but never call us union government," said Hon. Peter Smith and cheers.

Henry Criticizes. Hon. George Henry, acting leader of the Conservative group, saw a drift in fixing election dates to the American system, which he said was unsatisfactory. He thought it getting away from the British constitution.

The only changes in the acts announced by the premier was that there would be eleven days between nominations and elections, and the resident qualification clause was changed to read twelve months' residence in Ontario instead of the Dominion. The premier said he was prepared for "generous amendment" in committee if they could improve the bill.

FREIGHT PREPAYMENT TO SEND COAL UP

MONTREAL, April 26.—Authorities here state that one of the effects of the 10 per cent increase on freight charges from the United States, caused by the resolution to compel freight to be paid for at the starting point across the border, will be an immediate rise of 50 cents on every ton of coal, as most of the coal used here comes from the States.

CHRISTIANS IN URFA ARE REPORTED SAFE, SAYS RELIEF OFFICER

Dr. R. A. Lamber Confirms Death of Three Hundred Troops.

ALEPPO, Syria, April 26.—(By the Associated Press).—Dr. Robert A. Lamber, director of the American Near East Relief Committee in Syria, has just reached here from Urfa in the northwestern part of Mesopotamia, accompanied by Mrs. Richard Mansfield, Miss Mary Louise Law, Colin Clements and an Englishman named Garnet Woodward. The Christians in Urfa are reported to be safe.

The entire French garrison of 200 who evacuated Urfa, were all killed on the way to Djerdah. Aintab has been surrounded since April 18 by 5,000 French troops. Quiet prevails there.

A dispatch from Constantinople Sunday reported the killing of the French troops in the evacuation of Urfa.

DUKE OPENS HOSTEL

LONDON, April 26.—(By the Canadian Press).—The Duke of Connaught will open on Monday next the Duchess of Connaught Memorial Hostel at Bedford Square, provided for out of the \$50,000 donated by Canadian women as a personal gift to the late duchess. The hostel is intended for a short period in London, and will accommodate 60 guests. The charge is eight shillings daily.

FUNERAL SERVICE OF HON. A. G. MACKAY

EDMONTON, April 26.—The funeral arrangements in connection with the death of Hon. A. G. Mackay, minister of health and municipal affairs in the Alberta Government, who died Sunday, have not yet been completed, but a service will be held at 2 p.m. Tuesday in the First Presbyterian Church, after which the body will be shipped to Owen Sound, where burial will take place. The pall-bearers will be all members of the Alberta cabinet, and following the service at the church the funeral procession will proceed to the station, where a special car will be waiting to receive the casket.

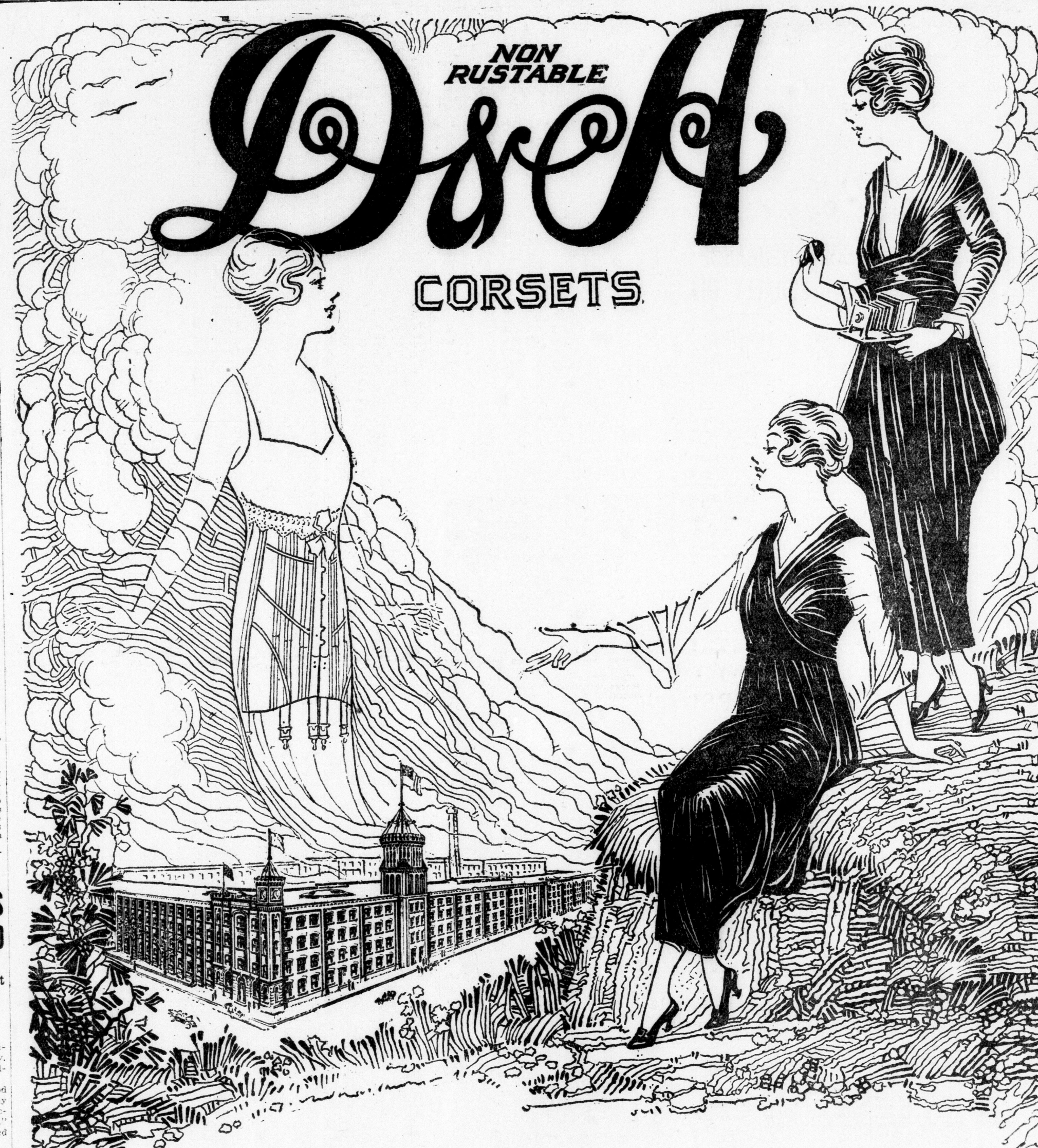
