BOARD IS APPOINTED TO MERGE RAILWAYS FOR THE GOVERNMENT SYSTEM OF ROADS

Howard G. Kelley Will Be the
Chairman of the Com-
mittee.

MONTREAL, May 25.—Announcement
made from Montreal Saturday that
the committee of management for the
co-ordination of the Grand Trunk Rail-
way with the Canadian National Rail-
way has been appointed, consisting of
Messrs. C. A. Hayes and S. J. Luther-
ford, representing the Government, and
Messrs. Frank Scott and W. D. Robb,
representing the Grand Trunk.

The four gentlemen above named ap-
pointed Mr. Howard G. Kelley, president
of the Grand Trunk, as the fifth mem-
ber of the committee, and chairman.
Mr. W. D. Robb, of Toronto, was
present on behalf of the Canadian
Government.

All members of the new committee are
well-known railwaymen. Mr. Kelley
has for some years past been
president of the Grand Trunk Rail-
way. Mr. C. A. Hayes is at present
vice-president of the Canadian Na-
tional Railway in charge of traffic.
Mr. S. J. Lutherford is assistant to
the president of the Canadian Na-
tional Railway. Mr. W. D. Robb is
vice-president of the Grand Trunk
in charge of transportation, construction
and maintenance. Mr. Frank Scott is
vice-president and treasurer of the
Grand Trunk.

Mr. Kelley, who has been
president of the Grand Trunk since
1917, has in addition to splendid
scientific and practical training the
qualities of mind that make for the
successful handling of big tasks. He is
a man, his associates say, who inspires
loyalty and affection that lead to
efficiency and accomplishment. His
capacity for work in a business where
hard and exacting labors are demanded
of all, is widely recognized. Work is
an integral part of his life. He finds in
the daily crop of problems relative to
railway administration all the exhilara-
tion that he needs. He has flung his
battles, won, and won in the
wilderness. As a young engineer fresh
from the university he took part, from
1881 to 1884, in the location and con-
struction of western railways, slept in
the open, and faced the hardships of the
pioneer railway builder's life. Mining
lured him away from railway con-
struction, but did not break his spirit,
and his engineering ability led to his
holding positions of steadily increasing
responsibility on the railroads.

In 1907 Mr. Kelley was appointed chief
engineer of the Grand Trunk Railway
System. Four years later he was pro-
moted to the position of vice-president
in charge of operation, maintenance
and construction, office which he
held to the date of his appointment as
president of the Grand Trunk and
Grand Trunk Pacific Railway.

The presidency of the Grand Trunk
has been considered one of the most
arduous positions in the railway world.
His jurisdiction extended over lines
which stretched from the Atlantic to
the Pacific in Canada, dipped down
through five states in the middle west
and traversed practically the whole of
New England. Scores of subsidiary en-
terprises associated with the railroad,
steamships, car ferries, elevators, hotels,
etc., demanded attention. Mr. Kelley,
in the opinion of those best fitted to
judge, is one of the ablest men who
have been associated with our Canadian
railways. He is a Canadian citizen.

Mr. Frank Scott, vice-president
and treasurer of the Grand Trunk
System, enjoys a somewhat unique honor,
in that during his 41 years of service with
the Grand Trunk Railway Company
he has risen from a junior clerkship
to a vice-presidency through the
department. He is a son of the late
W. D. Scott, M.P., for many years
professor of Mathematics, McGill Uni-
versity. Entering the Grand Trunk
service in 1878 he began work in the
transportation department, but was soon
transferred to that of the treasurer.

He became secretary of the board of
directors during his 41 years of service with
the Grand Trunk Railway Company.
In 1891 and was appointed assistant treas-
urer in 1893. In 1901 he was appointed
treasurer of the company. In 1906 he
became treasurer also of the Grand
Trunk Pacific and many of its sub-
sidiaries, and in 1914 was ap-
pointed to a vice-presidency of the
Grand Trunk System. A keen student

MR. W. D. ROBB.

Mr. W. D. Robb has risen from an
apprentice in the service of the Grand
Trunk Railway to that of vice-presi-
dent in charge of operation, construc-
tion, maintenance and equipment. He
is regarded as one of the most practi-
cal railroad chiefs in the Dominion. His
father was a railroad man before him
and came to Canada from Scotland to
join the Grand Trunk in its earliest
days. Mr. Robb was born at Longue-
ville, Que., and received his early educa-
tion at a Sherbrooke Academy and at
Francis College, Richmond, Que. En-
tering the service of the Grand Trunk
in 1881, he was appointed an apprentice
at Hadlow Cove in 1881. He went to Mon-
treal to finish his apprenticeship in
1883, and was promoted to the position
of foreman at Belleville in 1885. In
charge of motive power and car depart-
ments in the same year. In 1890 he
was appointed master mechanic of the
motive division with headquarters at
London, Ont., and in 1903 was ap-
pointed superintendent of motive power
at Montreal. Mr. Robb was promoted to
the office of superintendent of motive
power in the following year, a position
which he occupied until his
appointment as vice-president in 1917.
His jurisdiction extended over the
operating, maintenance and construc-
tion departments of the system. He is
a man of great energy, who holds the
confidence of the whole of the large
organization of which he is the head.

SALARY SCALE FOR TEACHERS PASSES BOARD

Recommendation of No. 1
Favored by School Trustees.

MANY INCREASES

Nurses, Art and Music Super-
visors Included in the
Schedule.

With very little discussion the board
of education at its special meeting
Tuesday afternoon passed the new
schedule of teachers' salaries recom-
mended by No. 1 committee. Under
the new schedule the maximum salary
for a principal of a school of fourteen
rooms or more will be \$2,700. Under
the old schedule it was \$2,200. Under
the new schedule the principal of a
twelve-room school will receive a
maximum salary of \$2,500, whereas the
maximum under the old schedule was
\$2,000. Initial salaries for principals
are to be fixed at the time of their
appointment, and they will receive an
increase of \$100 per year up to the fol-
lowing maximum: Eight-room schools,
\$2,400; nine rooms, \$2,450; ten rooms,
\$2,500; eleven rooms, \$2,550; twelve
rooms, \$2,600; thirteen rooms, \$2,650;
fourteen rooms and over, \$2,700.
