Cables Firmer—Hogs Higher at Buffalo, Lower at Chicago.

NEW YORK, April 3.—Beef—Receipts, 3048; steers firm to a shade higher; bulls steady; fat cows and medium well steady; to the higher; thin cows full steady; steers, \$5.75 to \$6.70; no choice here; bulls, \$3 to \$4.75; top, \$5.10; cows, \$2 to \$4; extra, at \$5. Exports tomorrow, 700 cattle and 300 quarters of beef.

Calves.—Receipts, 223; market about steady, quality considered; veals, \$5 to \$5.50.

Sheep and Lambs.—Receipts, 5533; sheep generally weak; lambs 15c to 20c lower; woolled lambs, \$8 to \$8.50; clipped do., \$7.75 to \$7.20.

Hogs.—Receipts, 4553; very few on sale; market steady; good medium hogs, \$5.75.

WHEAT OPTIONS WEAK OTHER GRAINS STEADY

Chicago Market Dull and Easier for Wheat Futures—Liverpool Also Weak for Wheat.

World Office.

Friday Evening, April 3. Liverpool wheat futures closed to-day 1/4d to 1/2d lower than yesterday, and corn futures unchanged.

At Chicago, May wheat closed 1/4c lower than yesterday. May corn unchanged, and May oats unchanged.

Winnipeg car lots of wheat to-day, 106; year ago, 158.

Chicago car lots to-day: Wheat, 19; contract, Corn, 185, 55. Oats, 169, 1.

Northwest cars to-day, 214; week ago, 188; year ago, 528.

Ohio crop report shows the condition of winter wheat, with comparisons: April 3, 1908, 80 per cent; 1907, 82 per cent; April last year, 87 per cent.

Argentine shipments: Wheat last week, 5,218,000; previous week, 4,948,000; last year, 5,056,000. Corn, 57,000, 24,000, none.

Bradstreet's reports: American exports of wheat last week, 2,500,000; last week, 1,844,000 bushels. Corn, 594,000, 345,000 bushels.

Modern Miller says: Reports from principal winter wheat states generally good. Wheat good color and making seasonable growth, well rooted and top growth now good.

ST. LAWRENCE MARKET.

Receipts of farm produce were 100 bushels of barley, 10 loads of hay, one load of straw, and a few dressed hogs.

Barley—One hundred bushels sold at \$4.50. Hay—Ten loads sold at \$18 to \$20 per ton. Straw—One load of sheaf sold at \$11 per ton.

Dressed Hogs—Prices ranged from \$7.75 to \$8.25 per cwt.
