NORTH TORONTO, Aug. 4.—(Special.)—Among the improvements that will be carried out in North Toronto the council last night is a water main on Roehampton-avenue, and concrete sidewalks on Soudan-avenue, Eglinton-avenue and Algoma-crescent.

"After the Metropolitan Railroad Company began their hourly car service from the city limits to the Eglinder of the city limits the city limits to the Eglinder of the city limits to the cit ton Methodist Church on Yonge-street, they quickly learned that the residents in the district served were in no wise dependent upon the accommodation given by the newly-created venture, possessing as they did their own con-

veyances, while only a small proportion worked in the city. The developments which took place the next three years were of historical importance. Some of the directors of the railway company, who were large landed proprietors in their efforts to popularize the district and create business for their railroad, constructed a grand stand and race track at Glen Grove. A toboggan slide was built on their Moore Park estate and

they agitated for the erection of the district into an incorporated town.
"The race track and toboggan slide were not successful, but as a boom was in progress in the City of Toronto it naturally grew out to the districts served by the leading county roads. Yonge-street, with its street railroad, proved attractive, but the available transportation facilities were inadequate and necessity called for relections. The Metropolitan Street Railway responded by interesting themselves in


