PROVIDENCE, April 22.—(Special.)— Toronto perished in the last ditch to-day, going down to defeat in the final session of a heartbreaking hard luck game, by a score of 3 to 2. All the way thru the battle things broke badly for Toronto and well for the Greys. Three men in Toronto uniforms were thrown out at the place when a score seemed inevitable, brilliant, almost phenomenal, plays by the home team shutting out the runs. The most spectacular piece of playing seen here in more than one season killed the chances of the Leafs for one or more runs, and probably the game, in the minth innings, when a great throw by Phelan and an equally grand stop by Peterson completed a double-play and retired the side, just when victory seemed in their grasp. Deal was the first man up, and scratched a hit to Rock, beating the throw by fast sprinting. Mullen lifted a fly to Horfman that was muffed after a hard run. Vandy laid down a neat bunt that Courtney fielded and threw to Arndt, who covered first base. Deal meved up to third and fullen to second. Manager Kelley and the entire Toronto bunch came to life and made things hum around the coaching line. Rudolph, who had been hitting hard all the game, came up and smashed a long fly to Phelan. He made a spectacular catch while on the dead run towards left field. Deal left the bag with the eatch and sailed for home at top speed. Phelan cut loose a throw while still running with the ball, and it went for the plate like a shot. It took the ground a yard from the base, and, althout the bounded badly, Peterson nailed it and touched Deal a foot from the plate.

In the second innings Mullen was retired at the plate when Elston relayed the ball from Vandy's single to Collins, and he got it to Peterson in time for the out; and, in the fourth, with Mullen on second. Vandy nearly knocked Lavender down by a terrific drive; the ball caromed to Collins, who stumbled as he took it but managed to shoot the pill to Peterson just ahead of Mullen. Altho the pitchers were hit hard and were wild they were there strong when men were on the corners, and were backed up strongly by the fielders. Deal scored in the second on his walk and singles by Mullen and Vandy. In the third Phelan walked and Atz hit for a base, and both scored on hits by Hoffman and Collins. In the fourth Shaw singled and tied up the score on Deal'
