COMPLEX PROBLEMS FOR LONDON CONFERENCE TOMORROW

Bursting of Water Main in Montreal Brings Death to Two; Injuries to 28 | Morden's Dream of Big Steel Merger Will Be Realized on Modified Scale

PETER SMITH SAYS MORRISON HAD OFFER OF THE PREMIERSHIP

Calls Drury Lincoln of Ontario—Twenty Millions for Good Roads. FROM MOTOR TAXES

St. Mary's, Ont., Feb. 19.—Hon. Peter Smith, in his address on the opening of the new L.F.O. clubrooms here this afternoon, touched briefly on the Drury-Morrison controversy, declaring it was an unfortunate affair.

In connection with the appointment of a district representative of the department of agriculture for Perth county, this appointment will be made, Hon. Mr. Smith announced, and a man will be sent about the first of July.

Of his own work, the minister had much to say by way of justifying his expenditures during the year. He mentioned the "mothers' allowances," the increased cost of upkeep for public institutions, the existing exchange rate, hydro expenditures, teachers' and inspectors' superannuation fund, a progressive education policy, and lastly, election expenses, which he jokingly called the best spending of the year.

The speaker mentioned the amount of tuberculosis in cattle, saying that it had been necessary to kill 84 out of 85 head at Monmouth.

Imports to Ontario was the announcement of a scheme to put \$20,000,000 into good roads, to be paid in ten years at the rate of \$2,000,000 a year from the licensing of motor vehicles.

IRISHMAN KILLED ON WAY TO LONDON

Throat Cut on Train and Paper "Shadowed From Ireland" Attached to Clothes.

London, Feb. 20.—On the arrival of the Fishguard train at Paddington station today, George Tilson of Black Rock, County Cork, was found in the lavatory compartment with his throat cut. A paper attached to his clothes was inscribed: "Shadowed from Ireland."

Belfast, Feb. 20.—George Tilson was connected with a firm of wholesale wine merchants. He recently received a threatening letter, charging him with spying in Ireland and ordering him to quit the country.

MAN FOUND MURDERED IN A NEW YORK PARK

New York, Feb. 20.—The body of an unidentified man, half covered by a snowdrift, who, police believe, was the victim of a murder resulting from illicit sale of whiskey, was found in Corona Park tonight by a 17-year-old boy. Two bullet wounds were in his head. The man had been dead more than an hour when found.

FRENCH STANDING FIRM AGAINST REDUCTION OF GERMAN REPARATIONS

May, However, Modify Views on Turkish Treaty in Return for Britain's Support Regarding Germany—French Have Almost Decided to Retire From Cilicia—Greece May Keep All Her Newly-Acquired Territory.

London, Feb. 20.—Aristide Briand, the French prime minister, and General Berthelot, arrived in London this evening for the allied conference with the announced resolute purpose of not reducing by as much as a centime the total reparations that Germany must pay as a result of the war agreed to at the recent Paris conference.

Altho M. Briand does not regard the 15 per cent. tax upon the value of German goods sent abroad as an export duty, because it may be paid from internal or any other revenue, yet that clause may be modified if another suitable standard to meet Germany's expanding prosperity can be found.

The French and British governments are not in entire agreement upon the Sevres treaty. It is the impression that Mr. Lloyd George will ask M. Briand to "stand in some respects on the Turkish treaty in return for steadfast British support with regard to reparations.

GREEK STEAMER BURNED; LOSS REACHES MILLIONS

Salonika, Feb. 20.—The steamer Admiral Kondouriotis, from New York for Sateoika and Black Sea ports, laden with lubricants and petroleum, belonging to the Standard Oil Company, has been burned in the harbor. The loss is estimated at fifty million drachmas, (normally \$10,000,000).

Thirteen Irish Civilians Killed Preparing Ambush

Cork, Feb. 20.—Thirteen civilians were killed and eight captured, of whom three were wounded, in an engagement this afternoon in the district between Lisgoold and Middleton, Cork county, according to a general headquarters report. It is believed to have been the largest number of casualties among the members of the "Irish republican army" in any single engagement.

FARMERS TO SUPPORT AMENDMENT OF KING

Hon. T. A. Crerar, Who Arrived in Ottawa Yesterday, is Expected to Speak Tomorrow in Debate Upon Address, Definitely Committing A granian Party on Issue.

Ottawa, Feb. 20.—Hon. T. A. Crerar, leader of the Farmers' party, came in this afternoon over the Canadian National from Winnipeg. He will speak in the debate upon the address probably Tuesday and will commit his party to the support of the King amendment. Mr. Crerar is in splendid health and spirits and will be in close attendance upon the house until the end of the session.

TOOK EX-SERGEANT OUT OF HOSPITAL AND SHOT HIM DEAD

Four Armed Men in Cork Commit Outrage on Wounded Man. SHOOTINGS REPORTED

Dublin, Feb. 20.—According to a report issued tonight by Dublin Castle, search yesterday in rooms in South Frederic street disclosed evidence that they had been used as headquarters for the "Irish republican army." Important documents were seized. No arrests were made.

Former Sergeant Nohilly was shot and wounded in Cork Saturday. He was taken to a hospital. Four armed men this morning entered the hospital and carried Nohilly, who was on a stretcher unconscious, into the street and shot him dead.

Michael Patrick Colivet, Sinn Fein member of the house of commons, was arrested Saturday. He was returned to his home in Dublin.

FIRE AT ST. JOHN'S, N.F., GUTS EPISCOPAL PALACE

St. John's, Newfoundland, Feb. 20.—The Palace, the residence of His Grace the Archbishop of St. John's, was gutted by a fire which broke out there at an early hour Saturday.

INTERNATIONAL SPY ARRESTED IN VIENNA

Vienna, Feb. 20.—Ignatius Triblich Lincoln, notorious as an "international spy" has been arrested here. The extradition warrant of a foreign government, presumably Great Britain, is understood to have been received by the Austrian government also will bring charges against Lincoln, alleging forgery of documents in connection with his recent activities, and also accusing him of raising in Vienna under false names.

BIG STEEL-SHIPPING MERGER EFFECTED IN MARITIME PROVINCES

Dominion and Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Companies to Join Forces With Halifax Shipyards Company—Col. Grant Morden Says Larger Objects of British Empire Steel Corporation Will Be Attained.

Montreal, Feb. 20.—(By Canadian Press.)—At the conclusion of the meetings of the boards of directors of the Dominion Steel Corporation, Limited, and the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company, Limited, held Saturday, it was officially announced that the boards of these companies had arrived at an agreement or the consolidation of the Dominion Steel Corporation, Ltd. the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company, Ltd. and the Halifax Shipyards, Ltd. under the name of the British Empire Steel Corporation, Ltd.

The agreements are subject to the underwriting of certain securities, upon the completion of which the boards of the companies will again meet for the purpose of approving the underwriting and fixing the date when the agreement will be laid before the shareholders of the interested companies for their approval.

W. D. Ross of Toronto, who is identified with the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company, and who attended the meeting in Montreal on Friday and Saturday, confirmed the above report.

CAPT. "TOM" WALLACE M.P. FOR WEST YORK VICTIM OF PNEUMONIA

Eldest Son of Late Hon. N. Clarke Wallace, Was Member of Federal House Since 1908 and Prominent in Orange Order—Served With Distinction in South African War.

The death of Capt. Thomas G. Wallace, M.P. for West York, took place early Sunday morning in St. Michael's Hospital of pneumonia, after a little more than a week's illness. Until within a short time before his death good hopes were entertained for his recovery, but a sudden affection of the heart rendered futile the efforts of attending physicians.

The late Capt. Wallace was first returned to parliament as a Conservative for Centre York at the general elections of 1908 and 1911. After the redistribution of seats he was elected for West York as a Unionist in 1917. He was prominently identified with the Orange order and at the time of his death was grand director of ceremonies of the Orangemen of Canada; and also rector's warden of Christ Church of Woodbridge, which by a singular coincidence was yesterday morning, or shortly after

MAY MY ARRESTS AT COCK FIGHT EARLY SUNDAY MORNING

More Than Hundred Prisoners Include Prominent Businessmen of Various Cities. ON DUFFERIN STREET

VOTES CONFIDENCE IN LLOYD GEORGE

TWO BOYS MEET DEATH BY BURST WATER MAIN

Montreal, Feb. 20.—(Can. Press.)—Two boys were drowned, damage estimated at over \$100,000, thirteen families were rendered homeless and 28 persons were taken to the Montreal General Hospital the result of a burst high pressure water main feeding the east end of the city, which occurred at the corner of St. Urbain and Dorchester streets, early this morning. Of the 28 taken to the General Hospital only two were seriously enough injured to be admitted to wards.
